Commencing near the outlet of the River Au Lac, the line follows in a South Easterly direction to a point between Tongue's Island and Fort Campbell; then in an early direct course along the valley of the Missisquoi to a place between two Lacustack Lake, and Miner's Point; thence curving round still further to the South East to the Main Line of the Tidnish River, near Chapel's Farm, where it takes a North Easterly direction to near the mouth of the river, and thence crosses Tidnish Head in an Easterly course to deep water in Baie Verte.
