### SAD DEATH OF COLLEGE GIRL.

Body of Wellsley Junior Was Found in the Charles River.

WELLSLEY, Mass., Nov. 29.—The body of Miss Mabel A. Williams, a Junior at Wellsley College, who had been missing since Sunday night, was found in the Charles River by the police today.

Miss Williams is said to have written to her mother that she would drown herself, and also told where her body might be found. Miss Williams had few intimate friends at college, and was considered by her fellow students as somewhat dependent. Miss Williams was 23 years old.

After the ceremony a wedding supper was served. Her travelling suit was of brown cloth with hat to match and long bright grey coat. ### AMHERST YOUNG CONSERVATIVES MEET.

AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 29.—The first annual meeting of the Amherst Young Men's Liberal Conservative Association was held tonight, when the attendance was large. H. L. Black, the president, presided, and the officers elected were: President, J. H. Douglas; vice-presidents, W. L. Ormond, Wm. Kenny, W. H. Tennant; secretaries, Neil Morrison, George S. Crossman; treasurer, J. Edgar Rodger. A capable executive committee was also chosen. The president-elect being about, T. S. Rogers was called to the chair, and after preliminary remarks called upon C. E. Tanner, M. P. P.

Mr. Tanner criticized the administration of Justice in the province, the government's railway policy, appointment of magistrates, road policy, etc.

A. L. Davidson, party organizer for the province, gave a review of the situation in the various committees, and condemned the conduct of some of the public institutions.

Daniel McLeod, M. P. P., referred to the system of public accounts and the auditing thereof, and brought up the question of loan companies and the duty of the government towards those who deal with them.

C. F. Jamieson, the conservative candidate for the county, clearly set forth his ideas of existing conditions with which the party has to deal, and closed with the words: "I have never seen him since. We parted as friends." He was testifying in his own behalf before the court martial which is trying him on charges that embrace manslaughter in connection with the death of Branch. When he left the witness stand the defense rested.

**REV. MR. COWIE ELECTED RECTOR OF FREDERICTON**

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 29.—At the adjourned meeting of the parishioners of Christ church, held this evening at the church hall at which there was a large attendance, the Rev. J. R. DeWolfe Cowie was unanimously elected rector of Fredericton. The nominees of the other candidates all withdrew the names of other clergymen and in doing so spoke strongly in favor of Mr. Cowie. They said that they had no hesitation in making the statement that they found it was the unanimous wish of those interested in the parish church that Mr. Cowie should be rector and that the appointment would find a congregation entirely united to assist him in his important work.

The rectorship of Fredericton is considered one of the leading positions in the diocese of Fredericton and by many is regarded, when everything is taken into consideration, as the most important.

Christ church, commonly known as St. Ann's, is heavily endowed and has under its charge three other churches, the Mills, New Maryland and Donk Settlement. The new rector will have the valuable assistance of Rev. C. W. Forster, who last year was appointed curate.

Rev. Mr. Cowie up to last year was for a time rector of St. Mary's, opposite the city. He is very well known and exceedingly well liked. It is needless to say that the announcement of his appointment is welcomed by all classes of citizens.

E. W. Bowman has resigned his position as manager of the Victoria hotel, and will be succeeded by Arthur Abinette, who has been chief clerk at the Sydney hotel, of which E. Leblond Willis is the proprietor, for some months. Mr. Abinette is well known here, having formerly occupied the position of chief clerk at the Victoria hotel. The new manager of the "Vic" is expected to arrive in the city on Saturday to take up his new duties.
