LOCAL NEWS.

Mrs. E. L. Perkins and two daughters left last evening for a trip to Montreal.

Miss Furlong states that the property on the corner of Market and Charlotte streets has not yet been sold, nor are either the Bank of Nova Scotia nor the Bank of Montreal trying to purchase it.

The body of the late Mrs. Thorne was taken to City's Station this morning for interment. Rev. D. Hutchinson conducted a service at the deceased's late home, High street, last night.

Charles Linton, teamster, of Victoria street, met with a painful accident at Indian town this morning. He was putting a piece of machinery on his sledge when it fell back, striking him on the head and inflicting an ugly cut.

Dr. Bridges stated today that John E. Wilson had been awarded a contract for erecting two steel bridges to run from Victoria school to St. Joseph's school. When these bridges have been placed, little danger will exist in these buildings in case of fire. Mr. Wilson will start work at once and the bridges will probably be completed in a month.

St. Mary's band has been engaged to play at the sports on the Victoria grounds on May 24th. It was learned today that a Kings county runner will compete in several events. All active members of the Everyday Club are requested to be at the Victoria grounds this evening. A meeting will be held at 8.45 o'clock.

FELL OVER THE WHARF AND HURT HIS BACK

A Drunken Sailor Dropped into the Mud in Market Slip This Morning.

William Simeson, a Swede, had a narrow escape from death this morning. He fell overboard from the wharf when the tide was out, and sustained quite painful injuries to his back. Simeson had until a few days ago been employed on the schooner Tuck. He was paid off and went to board at the sailors' lodging house on South Wharf. Having lots of money in his pocket he started in to have a good time. He imbibed freely last night and this morning started in again. The proprietor of the lodging house told him to get out at 5 o'clock this morning and the accident occurred shortly after that hour. Simeson was standing on the wharf, watching work on a schooner, when he was seen to topple over. He fell a distance of twenty-five feet, and it was thought by all that he had either been killed or met with serious injury. A crowd soon collected on the wharf and a driver of an express cart started to drive out in the mud and pick up Simeson, but the horse found the walking bad, and sank in the mud. Several men from a schooner went down and carried Simeson up on the wharf. He stated that he was badly hurt, and the ambulance was summoned which conveyed him to the hospital. On enquiring there it was found that Simeson was not injured seriously, but had received a bad shaking up.

TURKEY BACKS DOWN.

WASHINGTON, May 16.—The state department yesterday was notified by U. S. Ambassador Leshan at Constantinople that he had received a communication from the Sublime Porte stating as the result of correspondence and discussion with the embassy, the Sublime Porte sanctioned by an irade of the Sultan, has made the following concession:

First.—In applying the principle already settled of treating American establishments and institutions in Turkey on the same footing as those of other nations, the Porte having conceded to the correction of the registers of such establishments and institutions forming part of the list filed by the embassy, which were in the possession of and occupied by Americans, but without regular title deeds, an irade of the Sultan has ordered the execution of this formality for the establishments and institutions of which the embassy has asked the change of title and which were submitted to the sovereign sanction after examination by the competent departments.

Second.—The regular orders have been transmitted to the Vilayet of Angora in order that the local authorities should no longer raise objections to the construction of new buildings for the school and dispensary at Tala. Third.—The customs authorities in Syria and at Salonica are ordered to grant to existing American establishments the same customs immunities enjoyed by other similar foreign establishments.

Fourth.—The restrictions against cotton seed oil to be removed except in case of impure or adulterated oils.

IS NOW CHARGED WITH STEALING 5 STOVES

Mahoney Evidently Carried on a Big Business

Police Have Gathered in a Lot of Other Goods Identified by Manager of McClary Co.

That Wm. Mahoney, who is now in jail on the charge of stealing a stove, has been doing a big office business in the profitable sale of stolen property seems to be a fact, for now instead of being charged with stealing only one stove, he will have to face the charge of stealing five stoves, a large quantity of earthenware, clothes, pins, lanterns, silverware, a duster and an ice cream freezer.

Since Policeman Hamm gave out the information that he could locate the Kootenay range stolen from the McClary Company on the night of April 28th, Sgt. Kilpatrick and others on the northern division, with Mr. Irwin, manager of the company, have been untiring in their efforts to locate more stolen property, and they have met with success. The prisoner is in a very bad position.

The day following the arrest of Mahoney, Mr. Armstrong informed Manager Irwin that he had purchased a range from Mahoney. This was identified as stolen property. This morning Sgt. Kilpatrick and Policeman Greer made a raid on Mahoney's home on Short street, which is the first street east of the Marsh bridge. In the wood-shed and barn they found a comparatively new Kootenay McClary range, an oak heater, also about ten dollars' worth of enameled ware, an ice cream freezer, a bag of clotheings and a pattern, all supposed to have been stolen. Manager Irwin has identified the stoves, freezer, enameled ware and lanterns as goods handled by his firm, and says that no sale had been made to Mahoney.

The police say that the new range had been used in Mahoney's kitchen until the discovery of the last theft, and then it was removed to the barn and an old cooking stove put in its place. After landing this good haul in Mahoney's house, the police officers thought it wise to try next door in Mrs. Garvin's house. Mrs. Garvin is the proprietor of the property and in her house they found another oak heater that was purchased from Mahoney. A stolen stove and other articles were recovered this morning are supposed to have been stolen about a year ago. The police have a clue that may lead to the recovery of more stolen goods and it is expected that there will be other arrests as Mahoney is not thought to have been alone in his thieving.

TO CHOOSE MEMBERS OF GOVERNING BOARD

Of the I. C. R. New Provident System

Nominations Closed and Arrangements Made for the Voting all Over the Line.

The election by the employees of the I. C. R. P. E. Railway of two representatives on the governing board of the provident fund is attracting much interest. There are over seven thousand employees to vote and arrangements are very elaborate.

The votes of employees all along the line will be received by polling clerks who will travel either on regular or special trains for the purpose. To expedite the taking of votes the railways have been arranged in ten divisions, each provided with a poll clerk and assistant.

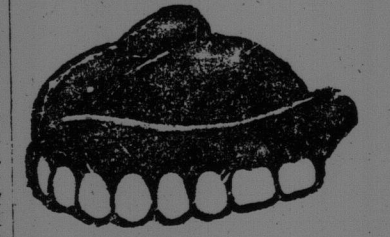

No. 2, Truro to Sydney, North Sydney and Sydney Mines; not including any employees at Truro; Stellarton, Pictou, and Oxford Junction; not including employees at Oxford Junction; and New Glasgow to Pictou Landing. No. 3, Salt Springs to St. John. No. 4, employees of mechanical department at Moncton. No. 5, other employees at Moncton. No. 6, Moncton to Campbellton. No. 7, Riviere Du Loup to Chaudiere Jet. No. 8, Chaudiere Jet to Montreal. No. 9, employees on P. E. Island. Those nominated by the employees of the different sections of the road are as follows: L. B. Archibald and B. A. Bourgeois, Salt Springs and St. John. N. B. E. L. Desardine, R. Bourgeois, employees of the mechanical department at Moncton; H. B. Dugan, H. B. Cordon, Moncton, employees (excepting mechanical department); H. D. McQuaid, Moncton to Campbellton; J. W. Nairn, Thomas Ryan, Campbellton. Riviere du Loup; Cedric Reeves, P. C. Sharpey, Riviere du Loup to Chaudiere Junction; Fred Tapley, J. A. Thayer, Chaudiere Junction to Moncton; Joseph H. Wran, P. E. Island Railway; J. T. McQueen, E. B. McPherson, Truro to Sydney.

The election here will take place on May 20th.

IRISH SOCIETY MAKES STRONG OBJECTION

DUBLIN, May 16.—The executive committee of the Irish Nationalist Society, considering Mr. Birrell's Irish bill to be an insult to Ireland and wants the Nationalist members of Parliament to withdraw from the House and demand a settlement of the "international dispute between Ireland and England," by the Hague arbitration court. It is also suggested that the programme published today by the organ of the Nationalist party be placed in the form of a resolution to be adopted by the executive committee of the Irish Nationalist Council. In it the Irishmen "who have attended the British Parliament for the past 21 years to support the British Liberals" are invited to return to Dublin and "devise measures for the material betterment of Ireland, and securing international recognition and support of Ireland's political rights, as the first step towards which she should claim representation at the coming peace conference and a settlement of the international dispute between Ireland and England by the international court of arbitration."
