JAPAN WILL INCREASE HER NAVAL ARMAMENT

TOKYO, July 21.—The Japanese Admiralty has decided upon a large scheme of rearmament instead of building new ships, the armaments of the old will be altered so as to bring them in line with the most modern ideas and with the requirements indicated by the war with Russia. Thus vessels of the Mikasa type, which have hitherto carried four 12-inch guns and fourteen six-inch guns, will henceforth carry four ten-inch, instead of fourteen six-inch, so that their principal armament will be brought up to eight pieces of heavy calibre. In fact their fighting strength will be doubled. Similarly in the case of vessels like the Matsushima, which were built for the old war, the programme is carried out and it will have the advantage of creating a thoroughly homogeneous fighting force.

THE SHAH OF PERSIA AND HIS PEOPLE

It may add to the interest which events in Persia are creating that it be remembered that the Persian belongs to the same great division of the human race as the peoples of Europe. He is an Aryan, and, despite all the changes of the ages, he retains much the same national character as he had when Darius and Xerxes, and was one of the great world powers. The modern history of Persia may be said to have begun in the seventh century, when, together with all the neighboring countries it was overrun by the Arabs. Until then Zoroastrianism had been the national religion, but in Persia, as elsewhere, the Arab brought with him the religion of his prophet. Fire-worship was destroyed, a few of its more determined devotees fleeing to India to found the sect of the Parsees (or Persians) and Persia became a Mohammedan country.

REIGNING DYNASTY.

For eight centuries it was the prey of Tartar and Turkish tyrants, but even during that time the national character remained, characteristic work was done by the people, and many great men lived, including the poet, Omar Khayyam. In the last years of the fifteenth century Persia once more became independent. The founder of the present reigning dynasty, Aga Mohammad Khan, came to the throne in 1794. He was succeeded by his nephew, who fought two wars with Russia, and lost his Caucasian provinces, and who was the great-grandfather of Nasser-ed-Din, who reigned from 1848 to 1896. Nasser-ed-Din was followed by his son, the present Shah, Mohammed Ali Mirza, being his eldest son, Nasser-ed-Din was a man of great energy and force of character. But in all respects he was an Oriental.

INFULENCE OF RUSSIA.

Musafar was more amiable than his father, war, and much more affected by European thought. He inherited almost overwhelming debts and the fact that Russia was his chief creditor of his country led to difficult international complications and to predominant Russian influence within his borders. The Persian police has been from its institution a Russian force, and the consuls who took part in the sanguinary proceedings in Teheran recently were Russian police in the pay of the Persian government. His son, the present Shah, is said to possess much of his grandfather's energy and there is no doubt that from the beginning he has been entirely opposed to the Constitution granted by his father in the last months of his life.

The power of the Persian Shahs had been unlimited. "No law exists in Persia," Professor Vambery said two years ago, and Lord Curzon in his "Persia and the Persian Question" wrote: "The language in which the Shah addresses his subjects and is addressed by them recalls the proud tone in which the Russian Emperor addresses his subjects." Practically from the time of his accession Musafar was anxious to reform the government of his country, and in his speech to the National Council in October, 1896, he said: "How sacred and blessed a day this is when we open a National Council! This will bring all the three powers of government and the affairs of the country into harmony with each other, so that the connection between the Government and people will be strengthened and fortified."

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LONDON AT PLAY.

LONDON, July 20.—The London Play Fields Society has 131 cricket pitches, affording accommodation for about 4,200 players; forty-four tennis courts, with accommodation for about 400 players; and fifty-three football grounds. Last year's receipts amounted to \$22,175, there being a deficit of about \$285 in the central fund.
