the stock of the United States Steel Corporation, King Edward, of England, has just cleared more than a million dollars as the harvest of a three month's bullish market for the Steel issues, according to a story told yesterday.

The story was given out yesterday in Wall street, and much comment was made on the significant fact that the King's agents placed his commission immediately after a visit pald him by Mr. J. Pierpont Morgan, who knows considerably about Steel.

Not only has the crowned head of England profited by the speculation in Wall street, but it became known that German royalty has been buying Steel and other American stocks, such as New York Central, Union Pacific, Southern Pacific and Northern Pacific, all of which have made substantial advances to the material benefit of the royal coffors.

It was three months ago when King Edward's agents went into Wall street for Steel. MADE PROFIT IN POOR YEAR.

Although 1908 was one of the poorest on record in regard to the salmon industry, the British Columbia Packers' Association made a profit of \$100,020, paying a dividend of 3½ per cent., adding the balance to the working capital after providing for depreciation, and after deducting charges and dividend on preferred stock, \$473,820 was carried forward from the year 1908, which was one of the smallest. Stock of salmon on hand on June 30 was valued at \$66,000, and stock of frozen fish in cold storage on June 26 was \$45,959, and sundry accounts \$22,348. There was due to the banks on June 30, \$250,493; outstanding accounts same date, \$47,297.
