## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homesteading entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

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## DRILL FOR THE NORMALSCHOOL

FREDRICKTON, Sept. 3.—Arrangements are being completed between the military authorities and the education department by which physical and military training will be given to the students of the Normal School. The matter will also be submitted to the university senate at its next meeting for approval.

The order does not intend to embrace the schools of the whole province, but it is understood that if any school board desires to have its pupils instructed in physical and military training, it may be supplied by military authorities and that the same will be approved by the Board of Education.

It has been decided to give the training in the Normal School after school hours. At the last meeting of the Board of Education a request was made by the N. B. Medical Society that a medical officer be appointed to give the whole of his time to control the origin and dissemination of disease among the pupils of the public schools in as far as may be possible. The board decided

that this could not be done without legislation, but no objection would be made to any city, town or other school districts employing such an officer. The board has decided that after the beginning of the school year 1910, all and Stevens geometry shall be used exclusively in all public schools this province, but during the present school year it shall be used for beginners and for those pupils who have not advanced knowledge of the subject.

The Normal School final and entrance examinations and the university matriculation examinations shall be based in 1910 upon Hamilton Smith's geometry, but this provision, which will be used for reference and comparison in the work of any grade. The use of Goggin's grammar shall begin at once, as all texts in elementary English grammar cover substantially the same ground.

Harcourt's copy books are to be used exclusively in every school, but any pupil who has not finished the work in his last copy book may complete it by order.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 3.—In answer to a question as to the object of his visit to St. John, Deputy Minister of Labor Adkin, tonight he was there merely to make a report for the government on the strike at the Dominion Coal Co.'s mine. ## PROMPT ACTION BY CITY AVERTS SUIT

Mr. Dunham Injured on Decayed Steps—City Rebuilds Them

On account of the prompt action of the civic public works department, W. H. Dunham, grocer, of Main street, has decided to forego a legal action against the city for damages to the extent of \$5,000.

A few days ago, while coming down the Indian town public steps which give the cliff dwellers at the head of the hill access to Main street, Mr. Dunham was precipitated to the street by the breaking of a decayed handrail upon which he leaned. His ankle was badly sprained in the fall. As a result of the accident, Mr. Dunham determined to sue the city. He called up Ald. John McMillan on the telephone and informed that official of his intention. Later, however, his public spirit gained the better of his sense of private wrong, and although he still believed his right of action good, he offered to waive it if the city would rebuild the steps immediately.

The city decided upon the latter alternative, and the steps are now being built. In fact they are about completed. While the workmen were engaged at the steps they were employed also to remove the old bell tower which stood just above them. Its supports had become decayed, and it was in danger of collapsing into the street, to the menace of passers-by. Thirty years ago the bell was placed in position as a fire alarm, and for many years it did good service, for some time been in disuse. The bell is still in good condition. Its removal leaves Indian town without a fire alarm nearer than that at No. 5 station, between Adelaide street and Douglas Avenue. Its removal does not deprive the people at the bell foot of anything they have had during the past few years, but the step has lacked them to a protest against their lack of fire protection.
