SUPREME COURT SITTING

TWO CASES TO BE HEARD

The sitting of the Madawaska Circuit Court opened Tuesday morning with Mr. Justice Crockett presiding. The Grand Jury which had been summoned was called, and the following found to be present, LeVite Laviole, Benoit R. Martin, J.-H. Michaud, Arthur Collin, Michel Abbis, Thomas J. Nadeau, Johnny Albert, Marcel Michaud, and Donat Rossignol, but as the prisoner who was to have been tried at the sitting of the court, had been disposed of, under Speedy Trial, the Grand Jurors were discharged.

Two cases were entered. Dr. Pio H. Laporte against the Royal Trust Company, executor of the Estate of Reverend Thomas Bergeron, and John B. Bellefleur —vs— The Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

The first case, involves a suit by Doctor Laporte for payment for services rendered from October 1927 to the date of death June 16th, 1930, to the said Reverend Thomas Bergeron. The doctor claims the sum of \$6,570.00 as the balance due, the sum of \$170.00 having been paid on account.

The second case, involves a suit by John B. Bellefleur, High Sheriff, against the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, for damages suffered by him in collision with a Canadian Pacific Railway freight train at Saint Basile in September 1930.

A jury consisting of Fred Cote, G. T. Kéroux, Urick Pelletier, Georges Bernier, James E. Clair, Leonard Cormier and Benoit Martin was chosen, after several of those called had been excused on account of not being able to understand English. It was necessary to summon two extra jurors before the necessary number could be obtained.

Mr. J. E. Michaud and A. J. Dionne are representing Doctor Laporte, and F. Dodd Tweedie and J. Thadde Hebert the Royal Trust Company. The opening address to the jury was made by Mr. Michaud in the morning and the first witness, Doctor Laporte, called. His examination was completed during the afternoon. The Cross Examination took the balance of the afternoon and was completed at an evening session of the Court. The case was continued and on Thursday at this time, has not yet been finished. The result and further particulars as to evidence will be published next week.

The case of Bellefleur —vs— The Canadian Pacific Railway was settled on Tuesday and the record was withdrawn on Wednesday morning.

Refreshments were served, and the meetings closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

Fire Destroys House Yesterday

The house of Alphonse S. Michaud, on Canada Road, was considerably gutted by fire, early Wednesday morning. Mr. Michaud got up and put in a fire in the store at about 4.30 A. M. and it is presumed that the fire which was discovered at about five o'clock, caught from the stove pipe or chimney. When the alarm was rung in, the house was in flames but in a very short time the fire apparatus and twenty-one firemen were on hand. They soon had the fire under control, and it was extinguished at about 5.30 A. M. The neighboring houses of Dr. Lockhart, and Mrs. Pelletier caught on fire several times and it was only through the good efforts of the firemen that the results were not more serious. Mr. Michaud's furniture was all destroyed and considerable damage done to his house. The loss is estimated at twenty-five hundred dollars, and the insurance is only two thousand dollars.

WOMAN IN CHINESE CAFE FOUND GUILTY ON LIQUOR CHARGE

On Saturday last the Provincial Police searched the premises of Goon Wah who runs a Café on Hill Street. In the room of Mrs. Mattie Bellefleur, a waitress at the Café, they found some beer. An information was laid against Mrs. Bellefleur charging her with having liquor for sale. The case was disposed of on Monday, the accused found guilty and fined one hundred dollars. The fine was paid.
