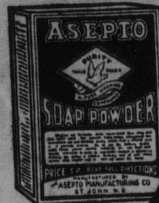

A REVERSAL

ONE FOR CHINA

Believes With His Attorneys

That Supreme Court Eventu-
ally Will Order New Trial ---

Talks of Dealings.

DESCRIPTS MANIPULATIONS

AS EVERYDAY METHODS

New York, Oct. 13.—Charles W.
Morse in his cell in the Tombs yester-
day, expressed the belief that the
Supreme Court would grant a writ of
certiorari for a review of the trial
upon which he was convicted and sen-
tenced to serve 15 years in the federal
prison at Atlanta."Of the 84 counts upon which I
was indicted," he said yesterday, "70
have been swept away and only 14
remain. These are called false entry
counts. The testimony of the directors,
officers and everyone was that they
were true entries; but because I gave
the profits to the bank—the jury con-
cluded that they must have been the
bank's own property. How could they
have been entered differently and give
the bank what I promised? They were
all profitable to the bank.""It is an everyday occurrence in
large corporations and banks for the
principal stockholders to make of
their own volition, some profit
for the institutions in which they have
pride. In these transactions which
have been so common, none of the
deposits of capital or surplus of the bank
was loaned, only the undivided pro-
fits."

WHEAT STILL SOARS.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 15.—Wheat advanc-
ed again today, showing a gain of
7-8 cents in the closing figures of yester-
day. Corn and oats also showed an
upward drift and provisions rang-
ed from five lower to 10 cents higher
than final quotations of yesterday.Peking, Oct. 15.—Today is an epoch
marking date in China's history. At
the capitals of the twenty-one provin-
ces of the empire, provincial assem-
blies will convene signaling the initial
entering of the wedge of popular
representation into this six-thousand
year-old government.The members consist wholly of the
gentry and student classes. No office
holders are eligible. The keenest in-
terest is manifested by the Throne
and the central government in this
radical innovation.

Far Reaching Changes.

While there are many pessimists, it
is universally recognized that this
event marks the beginning of far reach-
ing governmental changes which
will influence the future of the
empire. The Prince Regent
yesterday telegraphed to all the
Viceroys and Governors the special
edict defining the scope of the assem-
blies and their powers, in accordance
with the late Empress Dowager's con-
stitutional programme.While in the beginning the sole pow-
er of the assemblies is advisory, they
are designed as training schools pre-
paratory to the exercise of greater
powers each succeeding year until,
with the inauguration of a national
parliament eight years hence, they will
become real provincial legislatures.From the provinces come reports of
great popular interest. There are no
indications of trouble. Yesterday's
edict especially cautioned the authori-
ties not to permit the assemblies to
utilize their powers for purposes of
incendiaryism of any character.VATICAN GUARDED
AGAINST UPRISINGExecution of Ferrer After Di-
rect Appeal for Clemency on
the Part of His Holiness

Stirs Italian Fanatics.

Rome, Oct. 15.—It is stated that
the Pope made a direct appeal to
King Alfonso on behalf of Ferrer, but
his intervention was in the nature of
a suggestion rather than a request.
His Holiness did not insist upon his
appeal when he was informed that the
reasons of State rendered Ferrer's
execution indispensable.The anticlerical campaign is extend-
ing throughout Italy. It is, of course,
part of the Socialist and Anarchist
demonstration that was called forth
by the repression of these parties of
Barcelona and by the arrest of
Ferrer. Several priests have been
attacked in the streets and others
have been hooted at. Black flags
have been raised on many private
buildings and also on the headquar-
ters of the Socialists, but the flag at
the latter place was eventually re-
moved by order of the police.The Avanti, the Socialist organ,
urges the anticlericals to make im-
possible the lives of Cardinal Merry
del Val, Papal Secretary of State, and
Cardinal Vives y Tuto, both of whom
are Spaniards.The Vatican is being guarded by
troops, and protection is being given
to the Spanish Embassy to Italy and
to the Vatican. It is rumored that a
demonstration against the Embassies
has been organized to take place late

in New Brunswick. Though little pro-
pagation work has been done, it will
be reported that there have been ele-

since the last annual meeting. 37
Divisions reporting in the June quar-
ter, 28 show increases and of 17 al-
ready reporting for the September
quarter, 12 claim increases.The question of propagation work
will engage considerable attention at

HERE, IN TOILS OF POLICEArrested at Montreal Charged
With Tampering With Crown
Witness—Pleads Not Guilty
When Arraigned.Montreal, Oct. 15.—Joseph Page, an
employee of the Canadian Pacific Rail-
way, until recently running between
Montreal and St. John, and well
known as a promoter of sporting
events, was arrested at the court
house yesterday by Detective Markey,
who charges him with tampering
with a Crown witness.Page, who is said to be a friend of
Moore and Johnson, the arrested
last Saturday, charged with attempt-
ing to "fix" a race, John Donaldson,
Point St. Charles, out of \$1,000 on a
tip of a coin, is alleged to have offer-
ed Donaldson \$500 to withdraw his
complaint.When arraigned before Judge Lan-
cetot and the charge had been read to
him, Page pleaded not guilty. He was
later admitted to bail of \$2,000, and
enquire in the case was fixed for next
Tuesday. Not long ago Page was
given employment by the passenger
department of the C.P.R. after the
race track business, and it was
during the recent meet at Delor-
men Park that he made the acquaint-
ance of the men accused of taking
part in the attempted fix of the
Donaldson, they being race track
sports and apparently much in need
of coin, judging by their alleged ef-
forts to work Donaldson. Page is al-
leged to have interested himself in
the cases of the accused purely from
