PRICES WERE SCARCELY IN MOTION Trade Little More Than Drift Yesterday.

RAILROADS PLAY PART Many Contradictory Rumors Concerning Legislation and the Retrenchment Plans—Call Loans Firmer.

New York, June 14.—The movement of prices in the stock market today was hardly more than a drift. The board room traders, with their utmost diligence, were able to find but scanty material on which to base operations.

The morning advance was accompanied by professional satisfaction on the part of the board room element over the approaching end of the struggle on the railroad bill and by expressed hopes that public agitation of measures against the railroads would quiet down afterwards.

Reports were circulated today of retrenchment orders said to have been issued by Northern Pacific officials at the time of the rate injunction and not rescinded. An extra dividend of 2 per cent, declared by the Central Railroad of New Jersey, four per cent, by the Northern Pacific, also on Mobile and Ohio compared with only 2 1/2 per cent, in 1909, and the official confirmation of the Southern Pacific bond sale in Germany were ignored.

A slighter firmer tone in the call loan market was connected possibly, with the call on Atchison convertible bond underwritten for payment of 25 per cent, of their subscriptions. The foreign exchange market was lower today.

Bonds were steady. Total sales par value, \$2,007,000. U. S. bonds were overcharged on call.

Washington, June 14.—Various eastern railroads including the Boston and Maine, and also the Canadian Pacific have agreed to postpone the date of a proposed increase of ten per cent, in lumber rates from June 15 to August 1, in order to give the interstate commerce commission an opportunity to investigate the proposed increases.

Washington, June 14.—After a conference at the White House Senator Aldrich announced that a complete agreement with the railroad bill was in sight. It is said that the conferees have decided to take the House provision as to the long and short haul and the Senate provision giving the interstate commerce commission ten months in which to pass on new rates. The president wishes for a commission to investigate and recommend a method for supervising future stock and bond issues will be met.

New York, June 14.—The market today was dull and uninteresting; first prices were favorable and somewhat higher, but they gradually sagged about 10 points under neglect and scattered profit taking. On reading weather report which indicated excessive moisture and a minimum of sunshine over the greater portion of the belt, excepting Texas, where fairly satisfactory conditions prevailed, there was a smart rally and final prices ruled about 10 points higher than yesterday's final. Private complaints of boll weevil damage supplemented the favorable weather report. The bulls apparently remain in control of the situation and until there is more reasonable weather for the new crop, there seems nothing to menace their position.

Distressing Scenes in Montreal Morgue Girl Mourns Fiance Who Went Into Herald Building to Look for Work—Would Not Leave Body. Montreal, June 14.—One more body had been recovered from the ruins of the Herald at 11 a. m. today, making three in all, and two have been added to the list of missing, making a total of dead and missing of thirty-one. A corrected list follows:

The scene at the morgue is a terrible one. There are over two thousand people streaming through the doors, many of them weeping for friends they have lost and many more out of idle curiosity. Many of those who mourn stayed all through the night, hoping that the bodies of their loved ones might be found and returned to them. One of the most pathetic of the many pathetic scenes was the position of Jeanette Robertson, who was to be the bride in three weeks, and who will now wear crepe instead of a white veil. Her fiance R. Morrison, wished to change his position and went to the Herald office yesterday to apply for work there. When the crash came he was caught in the swirl of debris and has not been seen since. Miss Simpson stayed all night long refusing to go away and refusing coffee and sandwiches. Another sad case was Jennie White, who was to be married in two months to another employee of the Herald, Pitcher. He escaped but when he searched for his wife to be, he found that both she and her sister had been buried tons deep in the ruins. One of the dead, at least, is an Ontario man, D. J. Miller, was born in Appleton, 37 years ago and then moved to Carleton Place. He leaves three children, 11, 9 and 7 years. Today is the 11th birthday of Malsie, his oldest girl. Another of the Victims Jennie Robertson, was to have been married at the end of the month to D. B. Walsh.
