



Port Arthur, Ont., Nov. 14.—Fire in the office of the Daily News caused damage over \$10,000. All the stock was destroyed, the interior of the mechanical department was gutted and considerable damage done to linotypes and other machinery by flames and water.

**Record of Fatalities.**  
Ottawa, Nov. 14.—According to the record of industrial accidents maintained by the Department of Labor, there were 104 workmen killed and 324 injured during the month of October. Compared with the record for September, this is an increase of fifteen in the number killed and a decrease of ninety-five in the number injured. The greatest number of fatal accidents occurred in steam railways service, there being 23 employees killed. The building trades came next, with 15 fatalities.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency to the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or intending homesteader.  
Duties—\$15 monthly residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within 10 miles of the land in each of three years. At least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or her, or by his or her wife, daughter, brother or sister, must be cultivated in each of three years.
