

NAVAL DEFENCE A LIVE ISSUE IN SWEDEN

Stockholm, Feb. 10.—The question of naval defence dominates the political situation in Sweden. When the present Liberal government came into office in 1911, it appointed a special committee to consider the problem of national defence. One of the leading questions was the time of service for conscripts, especially infantry, which is considered on account of the nature of the country, the most important arm of Swedish services. The needs of the navy were also placed in the hands of the commission.

The results of the hearings have not been published, but Premier Carl Staaf has announced plans for the fortification of various inlets which form an important naval station on the coast of Norrland, and the building of six to eight semi-dreadnoughts, well armed and suitable for use in the Swedish home waters.

This, however, has not satisfied the demands of the country. Complaint is made that no plan has been adopted for increasing the period of training for the infantry and that the demand for a seasonal navy has been ignored. Much of the Liberal press is urging increased training and the maintenance of the navy at a standard of twelve respectable fighting ships. Even the socialists are veering towards the support of an increase in the defensive forces.

The uncovering of several cases of Russian espionage has increased the demand for adequate defence. Even the rural districts have become excited over the question and the farmers, who are not greatly devoted to the idea of conscription ordinarily, plan to gather late this month, 50,000 strong, in Stockholm, to demand better defensive arrangements. This meeting will be the most impressive indication of the seriousness of the movement, for these freehold farmers are the backbone of the nation.

THREE MILLIONS FOR HYDRO-ELECTRICAL WORK

Duplicate Trunk Lines of Niagara System and New Line from Welland to the Falls.

Toronto, Feb. 11.—Expenditures approximating between two and three million dollars are involved in the construction programme of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission for this year. After a lengthy meeting of the commission today, Hon. A. M. Beck, chairman, outlined the scope of the work that would be undertaken.

In addition to the duplication of the trunk lines of the Niagara system from Dundas to Niagara Falls, which will cost about \$700,000, a \$6,000,000 line from the Falls to Welland, is to be immediately constructed at a cost of \$400,000.

REPORT OF ANALYSIS ON DIFFERENT FOODS

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—A report issued by the Inland Revenue Department dealing with the adulteration of foods during the last fiscal year, shows that 3,000 samples of food, drugs and fertilizers, in all parts of the Dominion, were collected and analyzed during the year. The cases where adulteration were most noticeable were in regard to cider, baking powders, stock feed, vanilla flavoring extracts, ground, white and black pepper, ground cinnamon and cassia and turpentine.

Of the samples of cider analyzed 35 were genuine and 29 were adulterated; of baking powders, 115 were up to the standard and 35 below the standard; of stock feeds, 69 were up to the standard, or guarantee, 22 were below the guarantee, and four were below the standard requirements; of vanilla extracts 13 were genuine, 40 were classed as mixtures and 27 were classed as artificial; of ground black pepper, 223 samples were genuine, 11 were doubtful and 45 were adulterated; ground white pepper, 215 genuine, five doubtful, and 53 adulterated; of turpentine sold as a drug 106 were genuine, five doubtful and 47 adulterated.

ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY CRITICISED

London, Feb. 11.—Criticism of the decision of the Archbishop of Canterbury regarding the Kilguy affair, Dean Henson of Durham says that the archbishop satisfies the universal expectation by dismissing the proposition to demand for the trial of the two bishops on charges of heresy because they in a position of exceptional difficulty did manifest a sense of duty. At the same time the archbishop offers the would-be persecutors as a kind of spiritual support the assurance that the questions raised will be considered by a central consultative committee.

He declares that the final verdict will not be with the consultative committee or with the primate but with the church itself, Bishop Weldon, of Manchester, thinks that no one can object to a reference of the matter to the committee though, obviously, this will be a dilatory and perhaps indecisive mode of action.

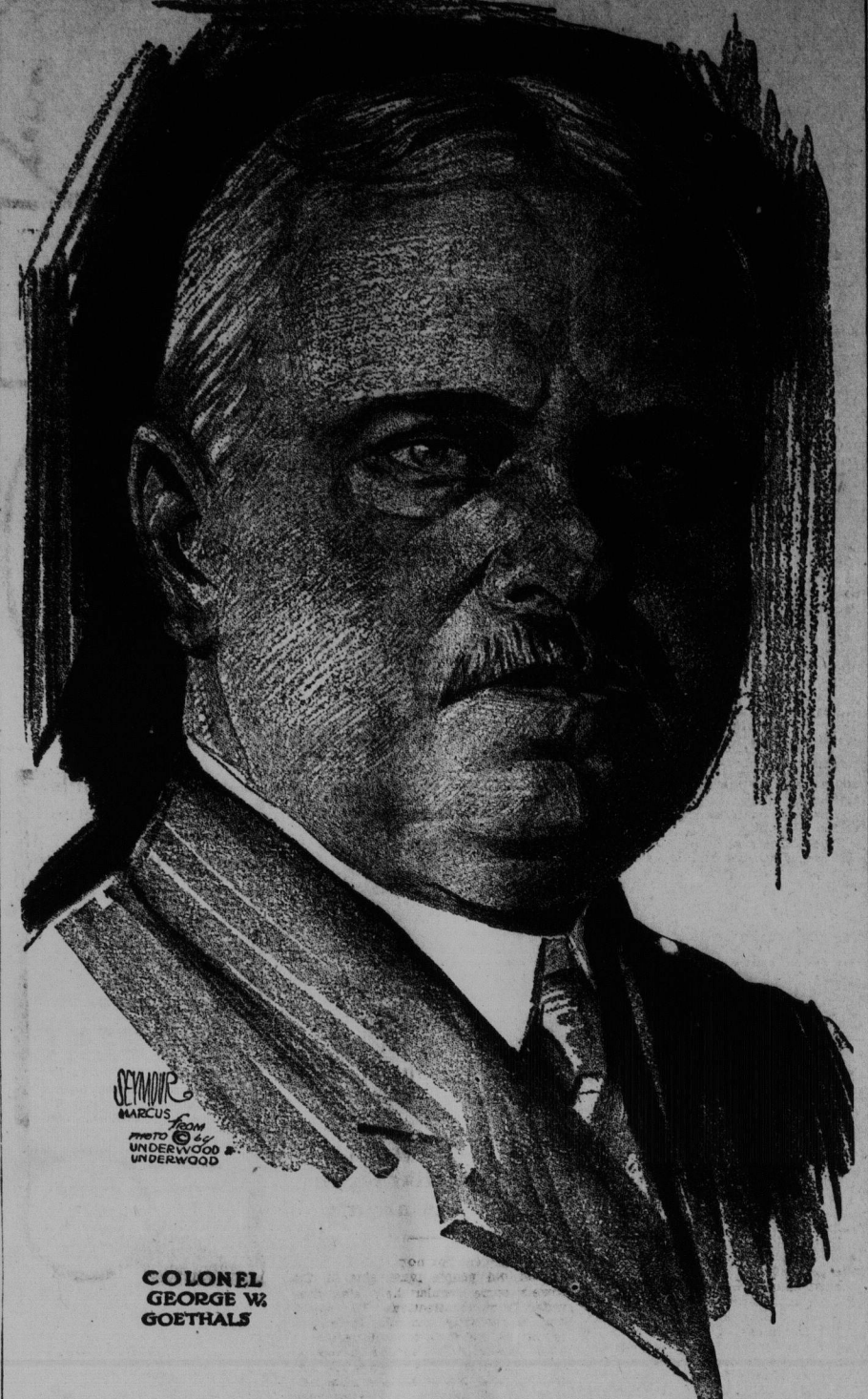

RIVER BOAT BURNS, FIVE ARE DROWNED

New Orleans, Feb. 11.—Five persons were drowned when the Mississippi river packet Gem was destroyed by fire last night opposite Hannville, forty miles from New Orleans. It was ascertained today.

The dead include E. J. Comeaux, 20 years old, son of Captain R. J. Comeaux, and clerk of the boat.

W. E. Barre, river pilot.

The three other persons drowned were a negro woman passenger, the negro steward of the boat and a negro member of the crew. None of the bodies have been recovered.

Those who succeeded in swimming ashore from the burning vessel were brought to this city by train today. Captain Comeaux of the Gem, was badly burned. He was taken to his home here in a serious condition.

STEAMER NICHOLAS WILL BE TOTAL LOSS

Would Cost Over \$90,000 to Make Repairs—Hundred and Ninety Plates Smashed In.

Sarnia, Ont., Feb. 11.—That the Str. Nicholas, wrecked near Alpena, Mich., and later brought to Port Huron by the Reids, after one of the most remarkable feats in marine history, is a total wreck, was the determination of the insurance adjusters, inspectors, owners and others interested when they examined the boat in the Reids dry docks today. An examination showed that the Nicholas had over 100 plates damaged by the rocks, and that it would cost \$90,000 to make the necessary repairs.

The bill for the work done by the Reids will amount to about \$50,000. The cargo saved from the wreck is worth about \$70,000.

OSCAR STRAUSS CALLS PEACE MEETING TO ORDER

Advocates of International Peace Working for Third Conference at The Hague.

New York, Feb. 11.—Oscar S. Strauss, former ambassador to Turkey, called to order, and David J. Hill, former ambassador to Germany, presided today at a meeting of advocates of international peace who seek to bring about a third international conference at The Hague. A committee of seven was appointed to co-operate with the United States government in any action that might be taken to this end.

Financial News Regrets Canada Hasn't Accepted Earl Grey's Plan Regarding Home in London for Dominion.

London, Feb. 11.—Referring to the Dominion House scheme, the Empire section of the Financial News regrets that the Canadian parliament is unable to agree on the contemplated outlay at the present time. It pointed out that this is by no means a decorative scheme as it is calculated that by renting the value of the premises will yield from four to five per cent. on the capital invested. Perhaps private enterprise or public spirit may grasp the opportunity that Canada so far is unable to accept. The Standard of Empire says that the matter of the choice of site for offices in London is one that each Dominion must decide for itself, but is convinced that sooner or later the wisdom and statesmanlike foresight of Earl Grey's plan will be recognized.
