Dawes Gilmore, who for some time was a resident of Fredericton and whose wife is visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Edwards, here, is now at Toronto, where he is taking the course to qualify for a commission in the Duke of York's Canadian Hussars. Mr. Gilmore is a son of Senator Gilmore of the province, and is connected with the third Canadian contingent—Fredericton, New Brunswick.

Delegates Return.
Mayor Mitchell, Ald. W. J. Osborne and Ald. Joseph Walker, who were representatives of the City Council, Coun. Harry Smith and Secretary Treasurer P. St. J. Bliss, representatives of the York Municipal Council at the ninth annual convention of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities, returned from St. John this morning. They report the convention as being very successful. The next annual convention will be held in Fredericton—Fredericton, New Brunswick.

Big Game Plentiful.
A. E. O'Leary, chief game warden of the province, was in the city yesterday. Mr. O'Leary stated that moose and deer were very plentiful in the hunting districts this season. Deer were not nearly as many parties of Americans hunting in New Brunswick this season as usual, but the number of local hunters was not much smaller than in previous years. Some violations of the game laws have been dealt with, and the offenders punished.

1,000 VOLUNTEERS FOR OVERSEAS BATTALION

Another Boom in Recruiting — 880 men at Armory, and 120 others have volunteered — Recruits streaming in from outside centres—Join at once or lose your chance.

With sufficient men volunteering to bring the strength of the 26th Overseas Battalion up to one thousand, New Brunswick is now assured of being represented at the front by a battalion peculiarly its own. Officers of the battalion announced last evening that young men wishing to have the honor of belonging to the battalion should volunteer without delay, as with the steady increase in the number of recruits coming to the ranks will soon be filled up. In fact it is expected that after tonight volunteers will have to take a big chance on being enlisted. Up to ten o'clock last night 880 men had passed the testing officers' hands and been enrolled at the armory. In addition to this it was reported that recruiting officers through out the province were sending in about 100 men, most of whom had passed a medical examination, and were considered as good as enlisted. Then at the meeting in the Opera House last evening twenty men volunteered for service, and it is expected they will bring in a lot of their friends today.

Yesterday was the busiest day for the recruiting officers. Up to ten o'clock 91 men had been enlisted, and the recruiting officers were still at work. A large number of men taken in yesterday came from the city, but bands of men are beginning to stream in from other parts of the province. Sixteen men came in from Miramichi and vicinity where Lieut. J. E. March and an automobile party have been conducting a recruiting campaign. A smaller party came in from Sussex.

Capt. Elliott sent in word that he expected to send in between 40 and 50 men from St. Stephen and St. Andrews, and a considerable party is expected from Fredericton, including a quota of men from the N. B. D.

In addition to the work of the official recruiting officers appointed by the military authorities of the division, officers of the battalion are working in all sections of the province, and a recruiting campaign will be continued. Tonight meetings will be held at Rothesay and Westfield.

On Sunday evening a meeting will be held in the Imperial Theatre beginning at 8.30, at which there will

be speeches and a programme of patriotic pictures.

Col. Humphrey Pleased.

Col. W. M. Humphrey, officer commanding the 6th Militia Division, was in the city yesterday and inspected the arrangements for mustering the overseas battalion here, and the equipment and facilities of the Army Service Corps. He also reviewed the battalion on parade. He expressed himself well pleased with the arrangements, and also with the appearance of the men.

Capt. W. A. Harrison has been appointed adjutant to the Divisional Ammunition Column. Among the young business men of the city whom it is understood will receive appointments are T. E. Ryder of Canadian Fairbanks, Wm. Vassie and Alex. McMillan.

Good progress is being made in the matter of organizing a company of "business pals."

Recruiting officers are indebted to Jack Russell of the Canadian Drug Company for a large quantity of cigars to be presented to volunteers.

Ltd., the City Fuel Company, the Consumers' Coal Company and George Dick, all of these firms having willingly and without charge provided the means of warmth for the cold time. Committees were appointed to act temporarily in view of the removal of the chief centre of work from the schoolroom of St. John's (Stone) church. There are many packages in the schoolroom, duly marked for the front via the Red Cross Society at Halifax which will go forward at the earliest possible moment. It is requested that all those ladies who have work outstanding will bring it to the new quarters, Chipman Hill, on Thursday next.

Votes of thanks were passed for the gifts of coal and for the kindness of the authorities of the Bank of British North America for the use of the bank building.

GOING AFTER GERMAN TRADE IN ARGENTINA

Canadian Trade Commissioner has advice for Board of Trade on subject.

The Board of Trade has received a letter from H. R. Pousette, Canadian Trade Commissioner to Argentina, pointing out the possibilities of Canadian manufacturers capturing the trade with Argentina formerly supplied by Germany. Mr. Pousette suggests that Canadian manufacturers and Boards of Trade should get together and send out men to represent a variety of lines.

The letter gives some directions as to how Canadian manufacturers and exporters should act in seeking markets in Latin America. For instance, he says quotations should be C. I. F. at port of entry. Brochure letters should be avoided. Such types of communications are greatly disliked by Latin America business men. Too much care cannot be given to the packing of goods.

HON. MR. HAZEN AIDS ST. JOHN

Through efforts of Minister of Marine St. John workmen are kept busy.

As a result of the interest taken in St. John and her advancement by Hon. J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, many of the industries here have been going full blast in spite of the business depression on account of the war. In several instances factories have been compelled to put on night shifts on account of the contracts received from the Federal government. When it was learned that contracts were to be let for Mr. Hazen immediately advanced the claims of St. John manufacturers and dealers with the result that several large orders were given local people.

One instance in particular was that of H. Horton & Son, who received a large order for leather equipment such as saddles, straps, bandollers, etc. An extra shift had to be employed and the wheels kept turning night and day in order to complete the order by December 31. Other factories that have benefited are those of the Wilson Box Co. Ltd., T. S. Simms Co. Ltd., and Manchester Robbins Allison, Ltd.

A. R. C. Clarke & Son have also been kept busy with contracts in connection with the steamers that carry the horses away from this port. This concern alone has kept 600 men going continuously in two shifts since the steamers started coming here. The shipping of the horses alone has been a big factor in keeping St. John workmen busy in a season that promised to be slow.

In connection with the shipment of horses A. R. C. Clarke & Son have made a record for this port that will stand against the best in Canada. In the loading of the steamer Anglo-California nine hundred and seventeen horses were put aboard in three hours and thirty-eight minutes actual working time.

Through the efforts of Hon. Mr. Hazen the port of St. John has been given an opportunity of showing the Empire what it can do in the way of handling shipments of horses and other goods.

The selection of St. John as a shipping point for remounts has been of great benefit to the city. Many men have been kept in employment and as a result something in the vicinity of \$100,000 has been left in the city. The shipment of horses will be continued during the winter and St. John generally should receive great benefits through this trade.

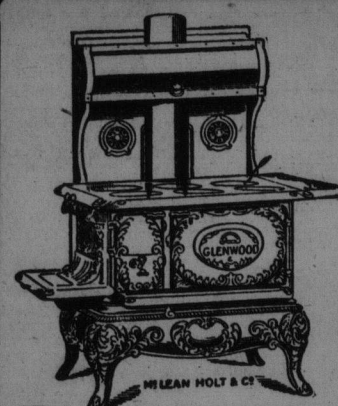
