MORE CAUTIOUS ATTITUDE IN TRADING FOLLOWS SINKING OF HESPERIAN

Traders inclined to await further details before making new commitments on either side of the account—No change in Foreign Exchange situation—Another arrival of gold and U. S. securities from England totalling about \$180,000,000.

New York, Sept. 7.—The light deal-
ings and relatively narrow price
changes accompanying today's market
were ascribed to caution arising from
the sinking of the British liner Hes-
perian. Traders were plainly disposed
to await further details regarding that
episode before making new commit-
ments on either side of the account.
Public interest was again lacking to a
noticeable degree, although much of
the day's general news was of a favor-
able nature.
Conditions affecting the foreign ex-
change market were without material
change, despite the arrival at Halifax
of another large consignment of gold
and American securities from London,
making an estimated total of about
\$180,000,000 from that quarter within
the past few weeks. Offerings of bills
on London were light at first, but later
they were of sufficient volume to de-
press demand sterling almost three
cents under last week's closing option.
Continental exchange was irreg-
ular, francs and lire also yielding,
while marks were more steady.
Stocks opened at one to two point
declines, reflecting the marked heav-
iness of our securities in London.
From that level there were immediate
recoveries, followed by another set-
back. Later the list settled into a

CLOSING LETTER OF N.Y. MARKET BY E. & C. RANDOLPH

(McDOUGALL & COWANS)
New York, Sept. 7.—Increased firm-
ness in the railroad stocks was the
feature of the day's trading, although
there was a sharp advance in the war
order issues at the close chiefly as a
result of covering of shorts.
The street is becoming hopeful of
an adjustment of the foreign exchange
difficulty, and if that matter were
satisfactorily disposed of, some large
contracts, which have been held up
temporarily would shortly be closed.
The Motor stocks were also strong,
and it was rumored that an extra di-
vidend would be declared on Studebaker
before long, and that at a meeting of
General Motors directors this month,
the long expected dividend action will
be taken on the common stock. The
exchange market was easier, last
week's advance having discounted the
arrival of the foreign consignment of
five million dollars gold and se-
curities, but there is nothing to indi-
cate a return of the demoralized con-
ditions seen on Monday of last week.
It will probably be some time be-
fore Germany makes a report on sink-
ing of Hesperian, and the probability
is that Berlin will disavow the inci-
dent, and that after some correspond-
ence the whole matter will be dropped.
Temporarily declines caused by any
change of its aspect should be avoided
for the purpose of purchasing
