

KAISER HAS VISIONS OF NEW ROMAN-GERMAN EMPIRE WHICH WILL DOMINATE THE WORLD

RUSSIANS ARE FIRMLY ESTABLISHED INSIDE THE EAST PRUSSIAN FRONTIER

Report from Petrograd Says Czar's Army Has Secured Firm Footing — German Emperor Says Germany is Fighting for Her Life— Sees Birth of Empire Which Will Make World Happy if German Arms Triumph in Present Struggle.

London, Nov. 3, 2.40 p. m.—The Star today publishes a despatch today from its Petrograd correspondent dated November 3, in which he says that the Russians are now securely established inside the East Prussian frontier.

Emperor William's thirty miles of barbed wire fence around his big game preserve at Rominten, the correspondent says, are now in the possession of his enemies.

London, Nov. 3, 2.50 p. m.—The Copenhagen correspondent of the Evening News has sent in a despatch in which he says that a German subject who heard Emperor William on a recent occasion when he addressed his troops against his Majesty as follows:

"We are now fighting for the life of Germany. They wish to kill Germany, but I say if we win—and we must win—a new empire shall arise more splendid than the world ever saw—a new Roman-German Empire which shall rule the world and the world shall be happy."

Paris, Nov. 3, 3.30 p. m.—In a despatch from Cetinje, Montenegro, dated yesterday the correspondent of the Havas Agency says that three Austrian aeroplanes on November 1 dropped a number of bombs at Antivari in an endeavor to strike a French transport ship and the three torpedo boats escorting her. None of the missiles reached its mark. Ten of them struck the quay, but did only slight damage. Others fell in the vicinity of the Palace of the Prefecture without causing any damage. Shots from the French torpedo boats and the batteries on the heights compelled the aeroplanes to flee.

Paris, Nov. 3, 3.15 p. m.—The Russian chief of police has issued an order allowing Turkish subjects until November 7 to leave Russia, according to a despatch from Petrograd to the Havas News Agency.

London, Nov. 3.—The London newspapers today print long accounts of the heroism displayed by the London Scottish regiment and First British Territorials under fire, and the hope is expressed editorially that their deeds cannot but inspire other young men to enlist.

THRILLING STORY FROM BATTLEFRONT

Letter Received by St. John Man Tells of Daring Work of Soldier who Spent Summer at Rothsay.

An interesting story of adventure with an armored motor car on the Empire's battlefield, is contributed by Second Lieutenant Ian Macdonald of the Royal Naval Division. Lt. Macdonald and Miss Attenborough spent the summer at the Kennedy House, Rothsay, and a letter sent to the Bedfordshire Standard of October 16 has been forwarded to Arthur Kennedy by Miss Attenborough to whom the letter was first sent. Miss Attenborough is a sister of Mrs. Macdonald of this city.

Mr. Ian Macdonald, Second Lieutenant of the Royal Naval Division, who is doing some daring work with his armored motor-car, with the British Expeditionary Force in Belgium. He was with the British Naval Force at Antwerp, and gives a graphic and moving description of the fall of that fortress, and of the terrible plight and sufferings of the refugees, many of whom he assisted on the road to Brussels and Ostend. The first letter was written during the bombardment of Antwerp: "Antwerp, Oct. 8th.

"Whether I shall ever get a chance to post this remains to be seen. This place being at the moment bombarded and on the point of surrender. During the last three days I have gone through hell.

Sunday, Left Dunkirk at 5.30 a.m. for Antwerp. Passed a burning village and many dead and wounded. Two shrapnel shells exploded within thirty feet of the car, without doing

any damage. Spent the night in a convent, being shelled all the time. A shell passed through the next room but one, and burst in the garden outside, smashing every pane of glass in the place.

"Monday. Up at five o'clock, at the mill headquarters. By 6.30 the mill was destroyed, and we retreated to a farmhouse three miles back. Were shelled continuously for four hours in a trench and dare not move. The houses here were heavy. The car only had one shrapnel bullet hit the screen. Retired again from these quarters further down the road, nearer Antwerp. Here there was a little peace, but I had to be continually taking people and stuff up to the trenches, which was rather ticklish work, as the car was a splendid target.

"All that night I spent riding about with despatches from Vieux-la-Petite to the front, in the dark, for to have one's lights on would have meant certain death. All this time I had no sleep at all, and only coffee and potatoes to eat, which were given to me by the monks in the convent.

"The next day being Thursday, I had a rest, being absolutely worn out, and had no sleep at all. The news since the previous Saturday. A shell has at this moment exploded in the next house. It sounds untrue, but it is not.

"God only knows what is going to happen here. We are in a fearful tight place, with no line of retreat except to Holland, where we shall be interned till the end of the war. There are other alternatives, such as being killed or wounded (for one takes one's life in one's hands here), or being taken a prisoner and sent to Germany, to dig trenches for German troops, or some such thing.

"However, all I can say is that up to the present I'm safe and whole, beyond that nothing, and thankful for it too. Tell mother all the news as I am too tired to write to her. I wish very much to write to her, but I am too tired to do so.

The second letter was sent from Ostend, and was as follows:

"This is just a very hurried note to let you know that I managed to escape from Antwerp alive. I wrote you a letter there explaining the situation, but never got an opportunity to post it till now.

"The agonies of Antwerp were too awful for words. . . . The refugees and the crowds on the road during the route cannot be adequately described. It is the sort of thing one has to go through to really understand. The bombardment continued steadily all day, and the town became more and more on fire. There were hardly any houses left untouched at 7.30 p.m., and certainly the streets were impassable at that hour.

"I left just about eight o'clock, over the pontoon bridge, expecting it either to be set alight by the burning petroleum on the water or destroyed by a shell, as they were trying to break the bridge. After we were over, the road was so densely packed that the car could only get five kilometres in one and a half hours. People crying and weeping, old men and old women carrying great packages of stuff—too awful the whole thing was. The troops had to march from Antwerp to St. Gillies—twenty-three miles—and many of them became stragglers.

"During the night we stopped at Bevern for three hours, and set off

WARNING TO GERMAN PRESS IN CANADA

Will be suppressed if Anti-British campaign is continued.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 3.—So persistent is the anti-British campaign in some German newspapers of Western Canada that the government has been obliged to deal drastically with the situation. Orders were issued today to the military authorities at Winnipeg, Regina, Calgary and Edmonton to notify all newspapers in their districts that the further publication of articles of a seditious nature or calculated to incite in the readers of these newspapers anti-British sentiment of a dangerous character would be followed immediately by suppression of the newspapers.

The instructions are so specific that an immediate stoppage of the anti-British, anti-French and anti-Russian campaign will be accomplished in a day or two, and its repetition will not be possible.

The government will also compel these German newspapers to print the British White Paper showing the British side of the case against Germany in the war.

WILL KEEP OUT CATTLE FROM ILLINOIS AND PENNSYLVANIA

Ottawa, Nov. 3.—The Department of Customs has issued an order prohibiting the importation of cattle, hay, straw, etc., from Illinois and Pennsylvania. again at three in the morning, before daylight.

"It was then, riding without lights and sleep for many nights, that the strain of the week began to tell on me. However, as there were so many stragglers and footsore men something had to be done for them. So I had to go back seven miles and collect some fourteen men got on board. Then we pushed on to Selzeate, where I had two punctures, which had to be repaired, as the Germans were in the neighborhood. With the help of everybody we again left in about an hour, and ran through to Bruges. Here we stopped for the night, and I slept from four p.m. till nine a.m. The next day we came on here to Ostend, and tomorrow for Dunkirk. Rumour says we are going back to England to recuperate after our awful experiences."

SAYS TURKEY HAS ESPOUSED UNHOLY CAUSE

Head of Mohammedans in India believes Sultan's hand forced by German officers.

London, Nov. 3, 1.23 p. m.—His Highness Aga Khan, who is known as the spiritual head of the Mohammedans in India, East Africa and Central Asia, has sent a cablegram from London, addressed to the Mohammedans in India and other British dominions, in which he expresses his deep sorrow that Turkey has joined hands with Germany in the war.

In this message Aga Khan says: "This is not the free will of the Sultan, but the will of the German officers and other non-Moslems who have forced him to do their bidding."

"He declares further that Turkey has now lost her position as the trustee of Islam. She has drawn her sword in an unholy cause, and the duty of Moslems today is to remain loyal and faithful to their temporal and secular allegiance."

NAVAL STATION ON ST. LAWRENCE WILL BE CLOSED FOR WINTER

Will be well fortified, however—Gov't cutter Margaret to Halifax for Scout duty.

Quebec, Nov. 3.—The naval station that has been established for the inspection of incoming and outgoing ships on the St. Lawrence at River Malheur, Island of Orleans, is to close for the winter months. The government cutter Margaret, that has been on duty there, ever since the opening of hostilities, will be sent to Halifax for scout duty for the winter. Reports that will be centered there, in the early winter.

AUSTRALIA PUTS EMBARGO ON EXPORT OF COAL AND MEAT

Washington, Nov. 3.—The United States consul at Sydney, N. S. W., reported today that the Australian government has placed an embargo on meat and coal, except to the Mother country.

Judge Fleming, chief of the Board of Foreign Trade Advisers, today received a cablegram from the American consul-general in Australia stating that the Australian government had also placed an embargo upon wool, wheat and flour.

Home From Convention. Rev. Wellington Camp, of Leinster street Baptist church, returned home yesterday from Toronto where he was in attendance at the Baptist Foreign Mission Institute. It had been well attended, he said, and many matters of interest had been dealt with. Rev. Dr. Hutchinson had been present, but had gone west on a short trip. Rev. Dr. W. E. McHenry of this city and J. W. Spurgeon of Fredericton were other New Brunswick delegates.

RUSSIANS REPORTED TO HAVE CLASHED WITH TROOPS OF SULTAN

Engagement follows Czar's orders to Causcasian Army to grip with Turks — Servian and Montenegrin Ministers recalled from Constantinople.

Rome, Nov. 3.—It is reported here that Russian and Turkish troops are already engaged on the frontier near Trebizond. This clash is declared to have followed instructions issued by the Czar to his Causcasian army to attack the Turks immediately.

Information reaching here says that Russia, in the expectation that Turkey would refuse to remain neutral, had already massed a large army on the border prepared for eventualities. Special despatches from Constantinople says that the Servian and Montenegrin ministers have also been recalled from the Turkish capital, according to the latest reports from Petrograd.

Foreign Minister Sazonoff, in replying to the Turkish apology, pointed out that inasmuch as Turkey had refused to expel the German officers from her territory her apology was without force and could not be accepted.

London, Nov. 3.—Russia has replied to Turkey's apology for the raids of her navy in the Black Sea with the fateful words: "To late," and in London it is hardly thought likely that diplomatic pressure will prevent the war party among the young Turks from dragging their country into the European embroilment. The events of the past twelve hours show that the Grand Vizier of Turkey has made every effort to conciliate the entente powers, but the influence of his partisans in the Turkish cabinet is not believed to be great enough to force the Porte to meet the demands for reparation formulated in the Franco-British notes. So far as Russia is concerned a state of war with Turkey actually exists, and the reply of the Russian foreign minister to the explanation of the Grand Vizier, does not hold out, in the opinion of London, any hope for a peaceful outcome to the dispute.

EFFORTS OF GERMANS TO REACH COAST SEEM TO BE COMPLETELY BALKED

Paris confident that enemy will get no further — Ypres front likely to be storm centre next — Britain promptly strikes at Turkey — Occupies town of Akabah in Arabia.

Paris, Nov. 3, 7 a. m.—Confidence is growing here that the latest offensive movement of the Germans in Belgium, whereby they hope to gain a clear route to the French channel ports, will fail. All reports that have reached here are that the allies have successfully withstood repeated and violent attacks of the Germans, hence the optimism that prevails.

The official statement of the Belgian general staff indicates a shift in the scene of the German attack from the north coast, where they fought so hard and stubbornly, to the vicinity of Ypres, where the British hold the line. This region, it is declared, has already been the scene of violent attacks and counter attacks, in which both sides have lost heavily.

The expectation here is that the Ypres front will now be the storm centre of the fighting for a time, at least, as the German objective appears to be the route to Saint Omer in the department of Pas-de-Calais, 25 miles southwest of the port of Calais.

The news of the French success around Sainte Marie-Aux-Mines, and St. Die in the Vosges region, was noted with interest here. The developments in this quarter assured the French of a solid position in a difficult region, where it is expected they will shortly win a greater success.

London, Nov. 3.—The fortified town of Akabah in Arabia, on an arm of the Red Sea, has been shelled and occupied by the British cruiser Minerva.

There was some loss to the troops holding the position, but no British casualties. Akabah is at the head of the Gulf of Akabah, 150 miles east of Suez.

The Admiralty announced this occurrence as follows: "Upon arriving at Akabah, the cruiser Minerva, Capt. Percival Warleigh, found the place occupied by soldiers and armed natives. One of the soldiers had the appearance of a German officer. The Minerva then shelled the port."
