The funds in the civic purse are pro-rided by the taxpayers. Unnecessary, excessive or untimely expenditure from that purse is therefore equivalent to taking money from taxpayers which otherwise they might, and would naturally prefer, to save or spend personally. t is in effect a hold-up by due process of law for which there is usually no remedy legal or otherwise after the fact. The time to begin controlling expenditure is before it is made. It is customary to divide civic expenditures into "controllable" and "uncontrollable." As a matter of fact, all civic expenditures

are controllable-if the control starts soon enough. Interest and sinking fund charges are controllable through the control of the capital expenditure which necessitate the debt charges.
