DISTRICT AND GENERAL

Closing at \$1.46 Friday, wheat reached the highest point in Winnipeg since the summer of 1921.

Owing to the crowded state of the West Lorne school it has been decided to use the town hall for an extra room.

A measure to establish a standard eight-hour work day in Canada was ruled out of order in the House of Commons.

The Tecumseh Memorial Boulder was unveiled at Moraviantown on the battlefield Sunday, with appropriate ceremonies.

Work on the waterworks system for Forest, which has caused a court action and several elections, has been started.

Chautauqua at Strathroy went behind to the extent of \$400 this year. There were nine guarantors, who will have to foot the bill.

October 23rd is the date set for the vote on the plebiscite. The questions to be submitted to the voters will not be made public until September.

A Liberal picnic, at which P. Hon. W. L. M. King, premier of Canada, will be the principal speaker, will be held at Government Park, Rondeau, on Monday, August 18.

Thos. H. Berry, of London, was fined \$5 and costs for allowing his son, aged 13, to drive his motor car. It is against the law to permit children under 16 to drive cars under any circumstances.

Wilbert Lodge, an employee of William McKay, of Dunwich township, fell about fifteen feet from a hay mow to the barn floor. He lay motionless on his head and sustained serious injuries.

Mrs. Jessie Martyn has disposed of her large brick residence in Alvinston to Charles Darville, of Detroit. The purchaser is a former Alvinston man and intends coming back to the old town to retire.

A motorist passing through Jordan the other day picked up a bill fold containing over \$1,000 in bills and \$5,000 in checks. A bootlegger is supposed to have dropped the "swag," which has not yet been claimed.

Chas. E. Clements, of Chatham, was elected District Deputy Grand Master of Chatham District, A. F. & A. M., at the meeting of Grand Lodge held in Toronto, to succeed Angus Graham, of Thamesville, who held that position during the past year.

Gordon D. Waide, a well-known business man of London, was killed on the London and Port Stanley highway Saturday evening when his car was ditched and overturned. Miss Georgina White, also of London, was badly injured. The accident is attributed to glaring headlights.

Contracts were signed last week for the construction of some 50 miles of provincial roads in various parts of Ontario at a cost of about \$1,250,000. Minister of Works Henry states that there has been a reduction in the cost of this work of about 25 per cent from the prices of last year, owing to the reduced cost of materials and lower rates for labor.

The death occurred at the home of her daughter in Middlemiss of Mrs. Jane Brown, widow of the late Joseph Brown, aged 72 years. Mrs. Brown was born in Metcalfe township. She leaves a family of six—William, Silas and Mrs. Alex. Williams, of Middlemiss; Thomas, of Newbury; Pernie, of Windsor; and Mrs. J. H. Wrightman, of Strathroy.

The death occurred at his home in Detroit of Charles Darville, a former resident of Alvinston. He was in his 66th year and lived the greater part of his life on his farm north of town, later building and operating a grain elevator for some time, and later moving to Detroit. The funeral was held from the C.P.R. depot, Glencoe, interment taking place in Alvinston cemetery.

The quest for oil and gas in Ontario, particularly its southwest section, will this year employ about \$400,000 of the public's money. Statistics which drillers are required to furnish to the department of mines at the Parliament Buildings indicated that the sum will be expended. Some 18 drillers are making returns to the department, their actual investment in drilling outfits being upwards of \$200,000.

McEACHREN PICNIC

The first reunion of the McEachren clan will be celebrated by a picnic at Memorial Park, New Glasgow, on Thursday, August 14. Committees in charge are planning an enjoyable day's entertainment, and all descendants of the pioneer McEachren families are expected to be present to renew friendships and exchange reminiscences of the early days.

TROPHY GOES TO CHATHAM

Glencoe Bowling Club held their fourth annual Scotch Doubles tournament on Wednesday, July 23rd.

The weather was ideal and there was a record attendance. Interesting and exciting games were participated in by forty rinks.

W. G. Brochenshire and F. J. Smith, of Chatham, won first prize (silver trophy and cut glass water sets) with four wins and a plus score of 30; E. Bassett and R. Jackson, of Petrolia, second (two wicker chairs) with four wins and a plus of 24; W. H. Levitt and Mr. Rath, of London, third (sweater sets) with four wins and a plus of 23; Rev. Mr. Doan and R. W. Clarke, of Ridgeway, fourth (electric iron and electric toaster) with four wins and a plus of 22.

Bowlers were present from Ridgeway, London, Petrolia, Chatham, Thamesville, Sarnia, Watford, Rodney, West Lorne and Walkerville.

A refreshment booth on the green, in charge of the Ladies' Bowling Club, was well patronized. Dinner and supper were served in the public school house by the Daughters of the Empire.

TEMPERANCE VOTES OF PAST

In view of the coming Provincial Temperance plebiscite in Ontario, many are asking the history of temperance votes in this province.

It was in 1871 that the old Ontario Temperance and Prohibition League was formed. This organization and its successor, pressed Sir Oliver Mowat for a vote of the people till 1879, when the first plebiscite was taken and a majority of 81,700 was registered in favor of prohibition, but nothing was done. A Dominion plebiscite was taken by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1888 when another majority in favor of prohibition was 13,000 in all Canada. In 1902 Hon. Geo. Ross took the second provincial plebiscite, when another majority of 56,201 was rolled up for prohibition.

In 1904 Sir James Whitney gave the province a local option law that enabled temperance sentiment to make some material strides in eliminating the liquor traffic, and the people of Ontario turned down Hon. N. W. Rowell's proposal to abolish the bar in the election campaign of 1914. In 1915 the Government of Sir William Hearst passed the Ontario Temperance Act, which has been in force ever since. Now there is an idea that sentiment in favor of this measure is not so strong as it was and it is proposed to submit the question to the people once more.

APPIN WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

At a recent meeting of the Appin Women's Institute, held at the home of Mrs. D. A. Campbell, a committee was appointed to arrange for the establishment of a sewing class for the girls of the community. The decision to institute this class was reached as a result of a suggestion sent out by the department. It was thoroughly discussed by the members and it was arranged to open the class in September, when the girls 10 years and over will be taught plain sewing, mending and darning.

A committee of institute members will be present at the cutting and the girls will be taught the cutting and stitching of garments under their supervision. Committees were also formed to arrange for the annual garden fete, which is to be held in the Community Park on August 6th, after which Mrs. D. J. McLean gave an interesting talk on "The Care of Children," in which she pointed out the influence of good music on children and urged the necessity of introducing music into the curriculum of the schools as a subject of equal importance with the others.

Mrs. Macfie read an interesting paper, after which afternoon tea was served by the hostess. Arrangements were made to hold the next meeting at the home of Mrs. Frank Nicholls. Special guests for the occasion were members of the Eureka Community Club of South Ekfrid. Mrs. J. W. Macfie, the president, presided.

INCOME TAX REFUNDS

Checks covering refunds to be made to income taxpayers who claimed \$300 exemption for children dependent upon them are expected to arrive at the income tax office in the course of a few days. The checks will come from the department of taxation at Ottawa, and will be distributed through the income tax offices. The refunds will be made to those who paid their income taxes on the basis of the \$300 exemption. During the month of March when the income taxes were being paid, the bill raising the amount of exemption to \$500 was first introduced in Parliament and subsequently passed.

This league consisted of Newbury, Mount Brydges, Walkers and Glencoe teams.

HARVEST FIELD ACCIDENT

Dan W. Leitch, living near Walkers, while reaping wheat with a three-horse team on Monday afternoon, was jolted off the machine and had two ribs broken, besides sustaining other injuries. The accident was caused by the horses becoming restive from annoyance by flies and running away.

DEATH OF MRS. JANE EATON

The death occurred Saturday of Mrs. Jane Eaton at the family residence, Dunwich, a short distance from Dutton. She had been ill for about eight years. Deceased was born in Ekfrid township in 1850 and had been a resident of Dunwich for about 16 years. Besides her husband she is survived by one son, John, of Ecfrid on a lake boat out of Cleveland, and one sister, Miss Kate McAlpine.

STOCK JUDGING CONTEST

London, July 25.—The junior farmers of Middlesex and Elgin counties will engage in a live stock judging contest, commencing at 9 a.m. August 5th, at the Hyron Sanatorium. Jointly with them the young ladies of Middlesex are invited to meet for the purpose of forming a county organization.

For many years live stock judging teams made up of Middlesex county boys have made very satisfactory showing in competitions at the larger fairs. Recently competitions in household science have been organized in which county and township teams of girls may participate.

We feel it to be important that the girls of Middlesex county organize in such a way that they may receive systematic training and compete successfully with teams from other counties. With this end in view we wish as many as possible of the girls to meet at Springbank Park at 10 a.m. Arrangements have been made to have ladies prominent in this work address the meeting. Members of the Junior Institute of Elgin county will also be present.

Each one is requested to bring a picnic lunch. When the boys have completed their judging they will return to Springbank Park for lunch, and the afternoon will be devoted to sports.

The judging of live stock will be preceded by instructions given by J. C. Steckley, Associate Professor of Animal Husbandry, O.A.C. Five classes of live stock will be judged.

CROP ESTIMATE

The first official estimate of the Canadian wheat crop by the Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa places the yield at 318,840,000 bushels. The major part of this, of course, is in Western Canada, where the forecast is not as promising as a year ago. Sensational correspondents are sending out unsupported reports to Chicago and elsewhere whose only effect is to excite stock markets and throw wheat traders into a panic. It is generally agreed, however, that the crop conditions in the southern areas of the three provinces are very satisfactory, with Manitoba as a whole very promising, though central and northern parts of Alberta and Saskatchewan are in need of more rain and better growing conditions. Recent downpours, however, have greatly improved prospects in many local areas.

CANADIANS RETURNING

Immigration to Canada since the opening of the season of navigation in April aggregated to the end of June 68,000, of which 52,000 arrived from overseas ports and 16,000 were Canadians returning from the United States. The latter is considered a particularly hopeful sign. Through the Sarnia gateways at an average rate of 500 a month, Canadians are passing, according to Chief Immigration Inspector Robinson, who said this number is far in excess of any previous year he could recall. The depression in the automobile trade in the United States is given as one reason for the exodus and another is that young men are returning for the harvest, mostly on the farms of their parents.

PRIZES FOR LAMBS

The attention of exhibitors taking part in the Appin School Fair is drawn to the prizes offered for the lamb classes.

The Ontario Sheep Breeders' Association has given \$12 to each of its directors to be used by him for the benefit of the sheep raising industry. Duncan Johnson, Appin, one of the directors, offers \$12 in prizes to the exhibitors at the Appin School Fair, as follows:

- 1.—Best Ewe Lamb sired by a pure bred ram of any breed—1st, \$3; 2nd, \$2; 3rd, \$1.
- 2.—Best Wether Lamb sired by a pure bred ram of any breed—1st, \$3; 2nd, \$2; 3rd, \$1.

These are very attractive prizes and should succeed in bringing out strong classes of lambs at this fair.

Welland, July 22.—A very quiet but pretty wedding took place on Wednesday night at 8 o'clock at the Methodist parsonage, when the Rev. The bride was attended by the groom's sister, Miss Ruth Stevens, while the bride's brother, Jack Little, very ably assisted in the dress of blue silk tulle, with hat to match, her flowers being of pink roses and fern. The maid wore a small colored silk dress with white hat, and carried roses and sweet peas. 40,000 HARVESTERS WILL BE WANTED FOR THE WEST

At least 40,000 harvesters will be required to garner the Western Canada wheat crop this season, according to information received at general headquarters of the Canadian National Railways this afternoon. Of this number approximately 20,000 will have to be sourced from Eastern Canada, it being thought that the remainder can be supplied by the three prairie provinces and British Columbia.

This information is the outcome of a conference held at Winnipeg between representatives of Canadian National Railways, Provincial and Federal Governments and the Labor Boards. It was also brought out at this meeting that harvesting is expected to commence in Manitoba about August 20th and in Saskatchewan and Alberta about August 25th.

A further meeting is to be held about August 2nd in Winnipeg to decide upon the date when the special rail fares for harvesters will go into effect. This date will be governed by the time when the farmers are prepared to accept harvesters. Representatives of Canadian National Railways were asked by the Government officials to state how well they were prepared to handle this traffic and they were told that the National Railway System has approximately 400 cars of the very latest type of colonist equipment held in readiness for the handling of the excursion. In addition there are ready for service on these trains a number of specially designed lunch counter cars, all of them larger and better equipped than any other cars of this type in the country.
