A third address on "The Ethics of Organization" was to have been presented by Dr. S. L. Walker, Associate Secretary of the Nova Scotia Medical Society, who was prevented by sickness from being present.

From 5 to 7 o'clock the visitors and a number of representative citizens were the guests of the Wolfville medical men and their wives at a reception held on the beautiful grounds of Westwood Hospital. Dainty refreshments were served and an excellent program of music was rendered by the College band. The day was a most delightful one and a most enjoyable time was spent.
