The editors of Canada today/d'aujourd'hui, the monthly publication of the Canadian Embassy, Washington, subsequently interviewed Mr. Roquet, and Mr. Allan Rowe, one of the task force members; a transcript of the interview follows :

## What was the task force?

The task force was created within minutes of the kidnapping; it was an autho informal group of officials which functioned in a very elastic manner in the Operations Centre of the Department of External Affairs. The Operations At w Centre is designed for just this kind of "crisis management" function. Its permanent staff and special facilities and equipment supported the task force woul operation in a variety of ways. But
