IN WELLINGTON CAMP.

Rich Showing on Evening Star—Strike on Winnipeg.

Greenwood, B. C., Aug. 26.—(Special).—By the bonding of the Evening Star and Silby for \$45,000 by Andrew Laidlaw attention has been directed to the possibilities of south Wellington camp.

The nature of the development is surface trenching and shallow prospecting shafts. The ore body is fully 100 feet in width between the formation of line on the west and porphyry on the east.

While in Wellington camp the respondent paid a hundred visits to the Winnipeg mine. He was shown over the underground workings by Mr. N. Tregear, the superintendent.

Ore is also being taken out from what is known as the "railroad vein." The workings are at a depth of 35 feet. Carload shipments from this vein netted the company \$17.50.

On the War Eagle, in Greenwood camp, sinking on the east vein in the old shaft is still in progress. The shaft has reached a depth of 30 feet, and some splendid encaloprite is coming to the surface.

The crosscut to the south at the 300-foot level of the Golden Crown, also in Wellington camp, lately passed through a fine vein of ore seven to eight feet in width and carrying good values. This is regarded as the most satisfactory development that has yet taken place in the mine since it demonstrates that the ore, in which two stopes have been worked at the 100-foot level with excellent results during the past few months, lives down to at least 300 feet and still going down strongly. The Golden-Crown has shipped to date nearly 2,000 tons of ore of good grade.

Manager Frank Sears, of the Earthquake group, is feeling very much elated over the fine showing being made on that property by the development now being done. Two shifts are now at work in the shaft, which is now down 65 feet on the new lead and constant increase in the value of the mineral is noticeable. The size of the ore body remains the same, and the character of the ore has changed but little, though there is a constant increase in the copper values and in the amount of gold as well. Gazette.

A winze is being sunk on the first vein in the crosscut north from the shaft at the 300-foot level of the Winnipeg mine, Wellington. THE SIMILKAMEEN. The Bonding of the Princess May—Some Interesting Strikes. R. Stevenson is jubilant over a recent assay of ore from the Jubilee claim, on Copper mountain. The returns show a value of \$104 in copper and gold.

The Red Mountain group, owned by J. Murphy and others, has some tremendous showings of ore containing a fair percentage of copper. An assay from the Bow Bell claim, on Whipsaw creek recently discovered by the Grutridge party, gives a total value of \$217 per ton in gold. The ledge is said to be nearly 5 feet wide, the ore being a rich white quartz.

The Rolo group, owned by Peter Scott and Robert Hedley, of Nelson, consists of the Rolo, King, War Horse, Kingston and Grand View, all of which have fine showings. An average of 16 assays from the Rolo went \$42.50. Charles Powell has bonded the Princess May claim to M. J. G. Lock, of London, England, for the respective sum of \$35,000. The Princess May is one of the banner properties on Copper mountain. Mr. Powell has shown great enterprise in developing his property, and thoroughly deserves his good fortune.

The Climax, I. X. L., Copper Chief and Czar, owned by George Cahill and H. Yates, form a very promising group. On the Climax the owners have run a 90-foot tunnel on the present level, from \$12 to \$20, and which they intend to further develop during the coming winter.
