Were this state of depression confined to the Metropolis, we might ascribe it to the absence of the Seat of Government and the circulation of the each of the over-paid officials, and, in that case, enould have cheering intelligence of prosperity from the rural Districts and Towns; but we receive therefrom no other than intelligence indieating the presence everywhere of depression, which seems to hang like a pall over Canada.

It is the aim of certain public writers in this Metropolis and elsewhere, to take no note of this depression, and it is their study to make their readers believe that all is couleur de rose. These writers will discourse by the column on the certainty of Reciprocity—anon they will amuse their readers with an idle tale about Protection, and then complacently point to the Customs receipts, which they are careful to conceal are inflated because of the extra duties our political financiers deemed it necessary to impose on importations, in the last Session of Parliament, to meet the prostrating effects of the loss of Protection to our commerce and agriculture in the English markets. Our imports may again this season serve to inflate Customs receipts, but we much doubt whether the business of the country will another year warrant the same amount of importations. Even as it is, we learn the latter will be greatly overdone the current year, owing to the depression to which we refer.

Our aim is to tell the truth and shame the Devil, or the Government, we care not which, and to deal with principles, not men. We therefore distinctly acknowledge that there is no remedy for the prevailing depression short of "Indepen-dence." It is not, we assert, the substitution of the preceding for the present batch of Ministers, but it is a Ministry composed of an entirely new set of politicians that we require.
