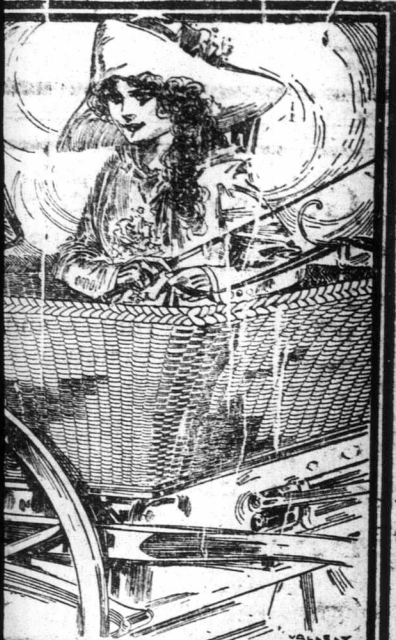

government was not altogether in
league with the Unionist party in
Great Britain, but in league with the
First Lord of the Admiralty and the
Liberal party in Great Britain. What
is true is that the government in
pressing this measure is in league
with every loyal Canadian and every
loyal subject of the Empire. I wish
to repeat what I said a moment ago,
that the members of the Opposition
have been given the widest possible
latitude. Now, if we propose to
make any progress with this bill I
think hon. gentlemen opposite can-
not complain if the rules of debate
are hereafter strictly adhered to. I
can say more, it is this, that if the
rules of debate who our fellow
to discussion shall not be found to be
sufficient to enable progress to be
made, then it will be the duty of the
Government to at once introduce
such rules as will enable progress to
be made. We recognize our respon-
sibility and our duty to our fellow
countrymen in this Dominion. We
also recognize our duty to the Em-
pire. Recognizing these duties, we
say in all sincerity to-night that we,
as a Government expressing as we do
the views of such a majority of the
people of this Dominion, can best
fulfill this duty to the Dominion and
the Empire by passing a bill, and we
intend to do it.

Mr. Oliver's Reply

Mr. Rogers' announcement was re-
ceived with vigorous applause by the
Conservative members. It fell to
Hon. Frank Oliver to get up to de-
fine the Liberal attitude. "I am sure
the committee," he said, "is fully
aware of the importance of the an-
nouncement just made, not so much
by reason of the announcement itself
as of the fact that the Minister of
Public Works and not the Prime
Minister made it. If this is as im-
portant an announcement of Govern-
ment policy as he would lead this
committee to believe, it is, I say, at
least, unique that it should be made
not by the Prime Minister but by the
Minister of Public Works. However,
it is no concern of the Opposition
who leads the Government. We are
concerned in the measures presented
by that Government to Parliament,
and we will deal with these measures
according to our best judgment.

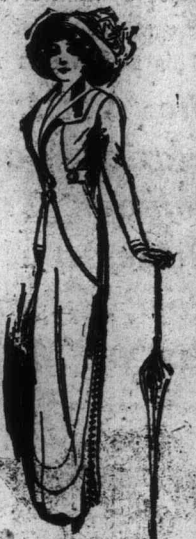
