Stratford Was Scene of Terrible Fatality Last Night--Chief of Fire De partment, Chief of Police and Police Constable, all Killed While on Duty.

STRATFORD, Ont., May 13.—At their post of duty during a fire which completely gutted the handsome Knox Presbyters Church in this city at an early hour this morning, Police Ch J. A. McCarthy, Police Constable Matthew Hamilton and Fir Chief Hugh Durkin were instantly killed when the huge ing belfry crashed from a height of 160 feet, catching the unfortunate men before they could rush to safety.

The three men were bachelors, and all were well known in Stratford for years. Fireman Sidney Vanstone was also struck by a flying timber and badly cut about the face and head. He is resting comfortably to-day.

During the progress of a light electrical storm about mid-night the one sharp flash struck the high steeple about halfway up, and it immediately took fire. The brigade was at the scene within a minute or so, but owing to no water tower the men were helpless, as the streams did not approach the burning spot.
