Sluicing on Mining Claims,

The work of sluicing on the creeks is not going ahead with that rapidity which was expected of it for the reason of the continued backward weather. Especially is this true where there is no thawing machinery on the claims and where the heat from Sol is depended upon to thaw the damps, the weather so far only permitting of from two to three hours work each day on such dumps.
