ONTARIO'S ELUSIVE BALLOTS.

Thursday's Associated Press dispatches informed us in relation to the ballots used in the recent Prince Edward County election, as follows:-

The ballots in the Prince Edward recount appeal, sent to Toronto on June 16, are missing. Registrar Cartwright and Col. Clark, Clerk of the Grown in Chancery, do not know where they are. Mr. Cartwright has the necessary papers in the appeal, but not the ballots. G. O. Alcorn, K. C., of Picton, was in the city try ing to get trace of them. In the appeal, the Conservatives claim that a number of torn ballots were allowed improperly for the Liberal candidate, Dr. Currie. If the ballots are disallowed, the majority would be reduced to nine, which the Conserva-tives hoped would disappear before a

A little later in the day the Toronto Globe came to hand with this further rather startling information regarding these same ballots:

"The ballots in the Prince Edward election, in which the recount was pro-tested, were thought to be missing for a few hours yesterday. They were muiled to Toronto on the 16th, but had not been received at Osgoode Hall, and the officials there knew nothing about them. Mr. G. O. Alcorn, K. C., of Pictor, with Mr. Eric Armour, was at Osgoode Hall yesterday, endeavoring find some trace of the ballots. They were delivered later in the day by the, Dominion Express Company to Mr. C. S. Grant, assistant registrar of the Court of Appeal, properly sealed

The Globe's statement of the recovery of the missing ballots is a most extraordinary one. The ballots were "mailed," it says, from Picton on the 16th to Toronto, but when counsel went to the proper place to search for them they could not be found, and the court officers had neither seen or received them. This was nine days after they had been sent from Picton, not more than half a day's journey from Toronto. Some hours afterwards, when the matter could not be kept from the public, these very ballots are said by the Globe to have been delivered by the "Dominion Express Company" to an officer of the court that should have been in receipt

of them over a week before that time. This ballott business becomes more and more mysterious and suspicious the longer the Ross Government retains control of it. A year or two ago the ballots of one riding that were needed for investigation were "accidentally" (f) burned while in the custody of a Government official, and the ballots of Prince Edward,
