

HAS VIEWS OF ITS OWN.

Lord Tweedmouth Refers to Canada's Aid in Naval Defence.

London, July 31.—In the House of Lords, Lord Brassey called attention to the proceedings in the Imperial conference respecting naval questions, and said the country had heard with satisfaction the Government's assurance that the all-red route would receive careful consideration.

Lord Tweedmouth said he thought the conference had gone a long way towards coming to an arrangement with the colonies regarding naval defence. It was unfair to say the Home Government had been indifferent to the interests of the colonies. The case of Canada was different to the other colonies. Canada always refused to contribute directly to the cost of the navy, though now the Dominion had taken over certain harbors, which was a great service. He regretted, however, that the Canadian Government could not see its way to becoming more active in naval defence, but the Dominion had its own views and the line taken by the Home Government was as it should be, very much a matter of their own judgment as to what way the colonies should help. In dealing with a general policy, Lord Tweedmouth said the Admiralty had in view a new and extended cruiser construction policy.

BRITAIN SCORES.

Gets In Ahead of United States With

Gets In Ahead of United States With Peace Conference Program.

The Hague, Aug. 1.—The British delegation are working on a proposition which, when it is presented, will cause considerable surprise, as it is in the nature of the unexpected.

As already cabled, the representatives of the United States have been privately discussing with other leading delegates the advisability of the United States representing a proposition for the periodical sitting of the conference, this proposition suggesting that it should meet quinquennially on June 2, beginning in 1912.

The British delegation went ahead of the Americans, having already communicated in the strictest secrecy only to a few delegates of the great powers, its proposition on the same subject, establishing that the conference should sit septennially, but that two years before the meeting special representatives of Great Britain, France, Germany, United States, Russia, Italy, Austria and Japan should meet to prepare the work for the conference, prearranging everything connected with its organization and the matters to be taken under advisement.

Thus, when the conference meets again its program will be already so studied by each country that satisfactory agreements will be the most easily reached.

In addition, although nothing has been said against Russia, the conference will no longer be monopolized by one nation, and will not depend, as heretofore, on the will of the sovereign of that country for its coming together and the fixing of the program.

The British proposition for the abolition of contraband was adopted in committee yesterday by 25 votes to 5. The representatives of the United States, Germany, France, Russia and Montenegro expressing themselves as opposed to the measure, and Japan, Spain, Panama, Greece and Roumania abstaining from voting. There were also ten absentees.

DUTIES ON FISH.

Nationalist Asks That Ireland Be Treated Like Canada.

Treated Like Canada.

London, Aug. 1.—Speaking in the House of Commons, John P. Boland, Nationalist, representative of the southern division of Kerry, called the attention of Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey, to the fact that the United States is the principal market for Irish cured mackerel, and asked the Secretary to use his best endeavors in connections with the negotiations now going on between Great Britain, Newfoundland, Canada and the United States regarding the fisheries ques-Newroundland, Canada and the United States regarding the fisheries question, to have the American tariff of \$2 a barrel on mackerel removed in the event of the Canadian fish being allowed to enter the United States free of duty.

Sir Edward replied that if a favorable opportunity eccurred to reals or

Sir Edward replied that if a favorable opportunity occurred to make an attempt to obtain a reduction of American duties on the produce of the United Kingdom, the case of Irish cured mackerel would not be overlooked, but he said the negotiations on the subject of colonial fish that had taken place some time ago had not led to any definite result.
