Coal Goes Up.

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 18.—At a meeting here Saturday of representatives of the New Pittsburgh, Sunday Creek, Fairmount, Kanawha and other coal companies in Ohio and Pennsylvania, it was decided to raise the price of all grades of coal at the mines from 10 to 15 cents.

Passenger Train Derailed.

San Antonio, Sept. 18.—Piles of iron on the track, supposed to have been placed there by wreckers, derailed a San Antonio and Arkansas passenger train Saturday night near the city limits.

The engine, baggage car and two coaches were turned completely over in the ditch. John Wolf, the fireman, was killed and Harry Martin, the engineer, was injured, and may die. Two passengers were seriously hurt. All lived here in this city.

Miss Lena Clarke Not Dead.

Toronto, Sept. 18.—Miss Lena Clarke, whose death was reported from drowning at the mouth of the Humber, is very much alive, and would like to know who was responsible for the sensation concerning her which was made out of the whole cloth. This sort of practical joking should be made a criminal offence.

PEACE IS NOW ASSURED

Latest News From the Norway-Sweden Conference.

Expect That Preliminary Result Will Be Reached For Submission to the Riksdag and the Storting Will Be Reached on Wednesday—Christiania Thankful For Peace—Part Played by King Edward.

Kalstad, Sept. 18.—The Norwegian and Swedish delegates sat in conference yesterday from noon till 2 o'clock, and from 5 until 7, at which time they adjourned until Monday. The question of fortifications is still being discussed, and some unforeseen difficulties have appeared. It is expected the discussions will be concluded Wednesday and the preliminary result will then be submitted to the Riksdag and the Storting. The Riksdag's approval of the result of the negotiations is sure, but that of the Storting is doubtful, especially if the Norwegian delegates yield on the questions concerning the fort.

The first official announcement indicating that the delegates of Norway and Sweden were approaching an understanding in their effort to establish a modus vivendi for the countries as separate Governments was given out Saturday night at the close of the joint session of the delegates. This announcement reads: "The probabilities are that in the near future the negotiations can be brought to a definite result."

Thankful For Peace.

Christiania, Sept. 18.—Peace between Sweden and Norway being assured a quieter feeling prevails here. The press is unanimous in hoping for a speedy settlement of the questions. There are some misgivings entertained that peace may have been bought too dearly, but all the newspapers express relief that peace has been secured, provided it is on an enduring basis.

The Afterpost says there are still some difficulties to overcome, but they cannot, according to human calculation, lead to a rupture.

The candidacy of a prince of the House of Bernadotte for the Norwegian throne is now considered to be settled.

King Edward's Part.

London, Sept. 18.—There is reason to believe that King Edward has taken a direct personal interest in the matter, and it is known that messages bearing on the situation at Kalstad have been continually passing between the Foreign Office and the King for the last two days. In fact, it is believed that King Edward suggested a modus vivendi.

Naval Collision Kills Three.

Christiania, Sept. 18.—A Norwegian mine boat Saturday night collided with a Norwegian torpedo boat near Tonsberg. An officer and two men were killed.

BRITISH EMIGRATION.

In 7 months, 67,728 Went to the U. S. and 57,249 Came to Canada.

London, Sept. 18.—British Government returns show that between December 31, 1904, and July 31, 1905, 67,728 persons of British origin emigrated to Canada, an increase of 10,000 over the number of British emigrants during the corresponding period of last year. Australasia took only 5,235, but this number was 460 more than in the corresponding period of last year.

The emigrations to India showed a decrease of 278, the number being 1,421. The quota to British South Africa for the seven months was 12,972, as compared with 13,513 in the same months of 1904. Other British colonies received 2,076 British emigrants.

The total number of British subjects who left the mother country for the colonies during the seven months was 80,465, an increase of about 10,000. Those who during the seven months left to foreign countries numbered 70,664, of whom the United States received 67,728.

The total of emigrants of British origin for the seven months was 150,909, an increase of 13,447 over last year.

INDIA'S ARMS DEFECTIVE.

New Guns Damaged In Shipment Must Be Returned.

London, Sept. 18.—Substantiation has now been furnished by unimpeachable sources for the rumors that the new guns supplied to the Indian army have been found to be so defective that they are being returned to England for alteration.

The delicacy of their mechanism is such that not one of them survived the voyage eastward to a state of efficiency. When tested after disembarkation the guns were found to be quite unequal to the requirements of active service.

This unpleasant discovery has caused the greatest concern in military circles at home and in India.

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FOR PEACE CONFERENCE

Powers Soon Again to Be Addressed on the Subject.

Roosevelt Won't Be Happy Till He Gets It—Last Winter Every Power Addressed Except Russia Responded Favorably, and the Case Accepted, the Principle Then—So Far the Prospects Seem to Be Bright.

Washington, Sept. 18.—According to a statement made by an official of the State Department yesterday it is practically certain that President Roosevelt will soon address the powers again on the subject of an international peace conference at The Hague. The step may be taken within a week, but it is more likely that nothing will be done until the President returns to Washington and confers with Secretary of State Root regarding the matter.

When Mr. Roosevelt does call the attention of the powers to the matter again, taking up his plan where it ended last winter, when the Russian Government spoiled the chances of a conference by refusing to participate until the war in the east had come to an end, the first step will probably be a circular note to the powers, suggesting that the time is now opportune for a discussion of the subjects which shall come before the conference. When the plans become partly defined, the Government of the Netherlands will issue a call for the conference. Such was the plan outlined last December, and it is not likely that it will be changed to any great extent.

Every power addressed ten months ago by Secretary Hay on the subject responded favorably, with the exception of Russia. The St. Petersburg Government, however, accepted the principle of the conference, but said that under the existing circumstances—Russia was not practicable for Russia to enter into a peace conference, Japan consented to participate, at the same time making a condition that none of the questions of the war then existing be discussed. It is believed here that it will take some weeks for the various powers to reach an understanding as to the subjects to be discussed by the conference and it is not thought probable that the meeting can be convened before some time next year.

There have been many questions brought to prominence by the Russo-Japanese war just ended, and these will undoubtedly be set forth by either Russia or Japan for discussion.

ARMISTICE IN EFFECT.

Pickets and Forces Are Moved Back—Red Cross Figures.

Godzyuany, Manchuria, Sept. 18.—An order by Gen. Linewich putting into effect the stipulations of the armistice arranged by Gens. Ovanovsky and Fukushima, has been published and distributed to the army. The order directs the immediate cessation of hostilities, the retirement of pickets from the neutral zone and the establishment of a post of communication. It forbids all other communications between the armies.

Armies Move Back.

Gunshu Pass, Manchuria, Sept. 18.—As a result of the armistice which was effective Saturday the outposts of the main positions on both sides will move back about two-thirds of a mile and hereafter will display white flags.

A representative of the Red Cross administration shows that altogether 30,000 beds and twenty trains were supplied, and that 100,000,000 were expended during the war.

Komura's Condition.

New York, Sept. 18.—The following bulletin was issued yesterday on the condition of Baron Komura, the Japanese envoy, who has been ill in this city for some time: "The condition of Baron Komura continues favorable in every respect and a prompt convalescence is expected by his physicians."

A SUCCESSFUL RAID.

Dutch Worst in Eastern Seas—The Germans Win Battle.

The Hague, Sept. 17.—An official despatch reports a successful raid made by the pretender, Sonnabait, of the Timor Archipelago, who recently invaded Dutch territory, killed 32 persons and carried off 42 captives.

More Fighting.

Berlin, Sept. 18.—An official despatch from Harushas, German Southwest Africa, says: "Major Kesslers column of colonial troops engaged the insurgent Herero warriors, of here Sept. 13th. After five hours' fighting the natives gave way, leaving 60 dead. Two Germans were killed and 12, including Major Laereker, were wounded."

U. S. General in India.

Washington, Sept. 18.—Major-General Arthur MacArthur, who has been the senior United States military attaché with the Japanese army, will not return immediately to this country, but for the purpose of inspecting the British military forces in that country.

Falls Overboard and Drowned.

Chatham, Sept. 18.—Bert Richmond, a freeman on board the steamer City of Chatham, is thought to have fallen overboard when the boat was docked at Detroit Saturday night, and drowned. He was about 25 years of age and his home was in Dover.

Jammed Fingers in Vice.

Belleville, Sept. 18.—The 7-year-old son of Sam Hibbard was playing with some other children with a vice Saturday morning, and in some way got the fingers of one of his hands so badly jammed that one of them had to be amputated.

Sir Gilbert's Lecture.

Ottawa, Sept. 18.—Sir Gilbert Parker addressed the Canadian Club on Saturday on "Canada 30 Years After." Dr. Courtenay presided, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the guest of honor.

Yellow Fever Bulletin.

New Orleans, Sept. 18.—The yellow fever report for 9 p. m. yesterday: New cases 24, total to date 2,712, deaths 3, total to date 335. Cases under treatment 323, cases discharged 1,913.

SCALDS IN THRESHING ENGINE.

Crawled Into Firebox to Make Repairs and Was Caught.

London, Sept. 18.—James Hood of London Township, when trying to make some repairs on his threshing engine Friday afternoon, was fatally scalded. He attempted to stop a leak in a pipe shortly after he had raked the fire and shut down steam. Crawling into the fire-box to do so, the first tap on the fire-box caused the remaining steam and hot water to fill the fire-box and Hood was terribly scalded. He was pulled out with much difficulty and brought to the Victoria Hospital, where he died yesterday afternoon.
