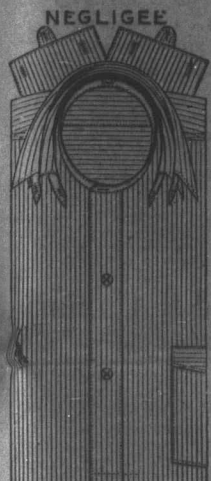

Miss Emma Archibald has been appointed teacher in the advanced primary department of our public school. Miss Godfrey, who resigned some time ago. Miss Archibald has been teaching at Grand Pré for the past year and has done very satisfactory work.

Sergeant R. H. Rye, of Kentville, formerly lieutenant in the Kings Canada Rifles, who joined the Mounted Rifles, is reported by the war office as among the missing. The many friends of the gallant young officer in this county sincerely trust that he may soon be heard from in safety.

Rev. D. O. Parker and the Misses Parker arrived in Berwick on Wednesday afternoon, accompanying the remains of Mr. Parker, who died at Dorchester, Mass., where they have been spending the winter. The news of the death of Mr. Parker was heard with regret by a host of friends here. The Acadian extends sincere sympathy.

We regret to learn of the serious mishap to the schooner Onetilla of this port. According to reports the schooner took fire while on the way here from St. John and had to put back. It was said that the vessel was practically a total loss and the cargo valued at \$4000 was mostly destroyed. We are sorry for Capt. Baird's loss and trust it may not be as heavy as reported.

The Rev. J. G. Angwin will preach in the Methodist church next Sunday at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. In the evening he will preach by special request a sermon on "The Bar was an object lesson to the church and the world." On Monday evening, 14th, he will deliver a lecture titled "The British and Boers in South Africa," in the vestry of the Methodist church. Mr. Angwin is a pleasing and popular speaker and ought to draw a crowd.

This week Mr. William Besser, of this town, received a rather interesting relic of the South African war, in a letter from his son Private Besser, of C. H. Borden, written from the hospital at De-Aer. The relic is a button which was shot through the arm at the battle of Paardeburg, and sent as a memento to a piece cut from his uniform showing where the bullet entered and passed through the sleeve. It is somewhat stained with blood and is naturally treasured by his father. At the time of the war he had just been taken from the hospital and he had very little to do. He happened to see by the side of the front room, and had made himself up to return to his post.

Notes on Educational Matters.

The Journal of Education has just been sent to the secretary of trustees in each section. He should peruse it and then send it to the teacher. To call attention to some of the most important new things in the Journal is the object of this short article. I. IMPORTANT DATES. Any day in May is allowed as Arbor Day. May 23rd, Empire Day; 24th, holiday, and last day for reception of applications for Prov. Exam. at Inspector's office. June 25th, annual meeting of School Sections. July 2nd, Grade A. and County Academy Entrance Exams. begin; 4th, Grade B. C. and D. Exams. begin; 7th, the Public School closes for summer vacation. II. GRANTS OF PROVINCIAL GRANTS. All teachers of Class A, whether in County Academies, High or Common schools, will receive Provincial grants of \$210, \$180 or \$150, according to the status of their schools. III. COUNTY ACADEMIES. The grants to County Academies are reduced. Those now employing one teacher and making an average of fifteen pupils doing High School work will receive \$300. Those having two A. teachers with an average of forty, \$500. When there are three A. teachers and an average of eighty, \$700. When there are four A. teachers and an average of one hundred and twenty, \$1100. It will be seen that the change is in giving part of the grant to the teacher instead of giving all to the teacher as heretofore. Teachers in County Academies will be treated in respect to provincial grants as all other teachers are. IV. MANUAL TRAINING. An Act was passed by the Legislature, at its last session, to provide for manual training in the school. When the conditions, as to building, equipment, teacher, etc., shall be met, a grant of \$5000 may be received from the Province for such a school. See Act and Regulations. V. DISMISSAL OF TEACHERS. The trustees by their unanimous resolution, approved by the Inspector for the district, may dismiss from their employ any teacher for incompetency. See Journal page 65. VI. EMPIRE DAY. It is expected that all schools will observe Empire Day on the 23rd inst. with hearty good will. The condition of matters in South Africa, the loyal sentiment that has been growing since the day was last observed and all our relations to the "Mother Country" make it a great pleasure to aid in the observance of the day. Teachers are expected to report to the Inspector what they and their schools do on this as well as on All of Day. VII. HOLIDAYS. The Queen's Birth Day and Dominion Day are the two remaining holidays allowed in the present or fourth quarter; but Dominion Day coming on Sunday will not lessen the number of teaching days. In the current school year there are 216 legal teaching days. VIII. LICENSES. The standard of Teachers' Licenses will be raised after January, 1901. 35% instead of 33% will be required on all imperative subjects and the age limit will be raised one year, so that the age for D. C. and B. will be raised to 17, 18 and 19 years. C. W. WOODMAN, Inspector of Schools.
