While a resident of Wolfville Mrs. Sears, who was a most estimable lady, was active in community interests and made many friends who will learn with sorrow of her decease. No particulars of her death have been received other than that it occurred suddenly at her old home in Kansas, whither she had come to recuperate after a severe illness. She is survived by her husband and two daughters, who have the sympathy of many old friends in this place.

## AVONPORT YOUTH BELIEVED SHOT IN CALIFORNIA

There seems little doubt but that the youth shot to death by a unidentified stranger in Paso Reubles, California, last week, is really Brenton Borden, son of Brenton Borden, of Avonport. Mr. Borden has received a description of the murdered man which closely tallies with that of his son who left home last autumn for the Canadian West on a harvest expedition, but has not written home save on one occasion, when he sent a post card from Moose Jaw. In order to prevent any mistake Mr. Borden has telegraphed to the California authorities to have the dead youth photographed and have a picture sent on. If the photograph proves to be that of Brenton Borden, Jr., his body will be brought home to Avonport for interment.

Mrs. Brenton Borden, mother of the young man, is very seriously ill at her home at Avonport, and knows nothing of the tragic end of her son. The family have determined to keep all details from her at least until there is no doubt but that it is Brenton Borden who sleeps the last sleep in distant California.
