Kelly Home After Fourteen Years Imprisonment

William J. Kelly, of Richmond, who became a figure of international prominence a few years ago, when he was lured across the United States border, arrested by United States officers and

sentenced to Atlanta Federal Prison, has returned to his home in New Brunswick, after completing the sentence.

People in St. John and throughout the province, who were deeply agitated at the time, will be interested in his return. His case was one that was discussed far and wide, was brought up in the

Canadian House of Commons and was also discussed in the U. S. Senate, and it is said, was the occasion of considerable feeling in high quarters.

His return has in a measure revived the animosity that was aroused at the time of his being kidnapped by American agents. He was sentenced in Portland in 1910 to four years for smuggling and ten years for assault on a United States officer, made in 1903, when he was endeavoring to cross the international boundary line with a load of potatoes. He was shot in the neck but with a sled stake laid the American officers low and escaped back to Canada. Extradition was refused by Ottawa on the grounds that he acted in self defence.

Six years later he was lured to the boundary line and, it is asserted, was pulled across and arrested by United States officers.

During the Taft administration the British ambassador, James Bryce, asked for a pardon so that the man might go to the bedside of his dying wife, whose heart slowly broke under an effort to keep her brood of ten children together. The request for a pardon was refused and Mrs. Kelly died. One daughter died the day before his arrival home. One son gave his life in Flanders and the Canadian government has so far refused any allowance to assist in helping this distracted family.

THE PRairie PIRATE

Settlers Have Trouble With the Coyotes.

"Those rascally coyotes have been killing my sheep again, and last week they got my finest prize lamb," lamented a householder on the Saskatchewan prairie a few days ago. "Strange to say," he went on, "my next-door neighbor, just three miles away, does not seem to lose any, but there's no credit due the coyotes on that account for a sharp look-out kept, and he is able to be among his sheep several times a day."

"Why do you not shoot, trap or poison them and receive a good price for their skins, as well as the bounty?" was suggested. "We settlers have been shooting, poisoning and trapping them ever since there were settlers on the prairie, and Indians before us, but coyotes are too wise to be caught by trap or poison, and run

short a mile or more away. The worst of it is that every spring each pair breeds several more than it can eat, and by the late summer the young broods have developed an appetite for farmyard fowl, chickens, turkeys, ducks, wild ducks and jack rabbits are not good enough for them when they can get their teeth into something better," he concluded.

This open winter and late, mild autumn have been a good friend to the prairie wolf, or coyote. Usually the deep snow and low thermometer makes the cost of living very high for coyotes during the dreary winter months. Last winter was so cold and the snow so deep that they were driven to seek food on the outskirts of prairie towns and cities and were hungry and bold enough to run across the railway tracks on the streets in the outskirts of Regina.

Fortuna has favored them this winter and while poor humans were suffering at the high price of lamb and veal, coyotes on the prairies were indulging sumptuously on both. Lamb and veal, turkeys, with carcasses of turkeys, jack rabbits, domestic and prairie chickens, have been the order of the day, seven days of the week. Consequently the fur on the coyote is in better condition than usual and as high as \$35 is being paid for their pelts.

Although the coyote helps himself liberally to live stock and poultry, he has no intention of paying for them with his pelt and takes every precaution to arrange to separate one or two sheep or lambs from the flock.

When a flock of sheep becomes restless and nervous, the trouble brewing. Mr. Coyote is somewhere at a point of vantage waiting for the psychological moment, which means the best opportunity to separate one or two sheep or lambs from the flock.

As soon as the sheep see the coyote they stampede, but already the wolf has slipped up the situation and is driving one or two in a safe direction, where he has already laid his plans. Having obtained his objective, his craftiest work is made short work of the fear-stricken victim.

Before visiting the poultry pens coyotes come quite near the house. Should any one appear he will turn around and go trotting leisurely away, as if to say "at a more convenient season," but if there is a gun they disappear like the wind. Nothing is sadder than the coyotes, excepting the wolf-hound, which the most successful hunters take for the hunt. A couple of hounds and a "killer" are put in the back of the wagon and covered from sight. When a coyote is sighted the hounds are uncovered and start in pursuit.

In a very short time their great speed brings the coyote to bay. A battle ensues and by that time the "killer" (a slower dog) arrives and finishes the coyote. Last January when a capture was made in this way one great hound was wounded so badly that he was lame for weeks. "What we have to build" cannot be said of every bulldog especially when a coyote is in the game. A certain building which developed a habit of riding on the side of a motor frequently jumped off to his doom. One morning he went trotting after a coyote. After a mad chase the coyote reached his den, a deep hole in the earth, and disappeared, and the bulldog followed him. What occurred underground is hard to say, but in a very short time the bulldog had found his way out for open combat. During a terrible struggle the coyote seized an opportunity to make his den again and the bulldog, much relieved, made a dash for freedom, a sadder and wiser dog.

Coyotes will stand for hours on some high point of land watching the grazing cattle and sheep and at the same time keep very alert to any movement about the homestead or on the trail. After a traveler has passed the coyote makes a thorough investigation of the trail and having sufficiently satisfied his curiosity, takes up his post of observation again.

They do a lot of prowling at night, and just after sundown their shrill evening song can be heard at great distances. A little later on the dark curtains of night close over the prairie and the northern lights dance their mystic dances along the horizon and up to mid heaven the long challenges of the coyotes sound doubly weird and plaintive.
