Hitchcock, at the ripe age of 91 years, in the person of "Aunt Mahala Lacroix". As she was called by all, widow of the late Amos Lacroix. Her husband was gone to death by a bull many years ago. The deceased was a familiar figure around the railway station and on our streets, having carried the mail from the time the train first carried the mail up this way until a few years ago, when she was struck by an engine on the crossing and had her hip broken and later she suffered a paralytic shock. She was respected by all. Three children were born to her, all of whom have passed away: George W. died several years ago; Amos, a C.P.R. brakeman, was killed by his train; and Mary (Mrs. Craig) of Waterville died a few weeks ago. An adopted daughter lives in California and there are several grandchildren, sisters and other relatives. For several years she has been tenderly cared for by Mrs. Hitchcock and her granddaughter, Edna Lacroix, and much credit is due them for in her later years she required much attention.

The funeral took place on Sunday at the United Baptist church, Rev. G. A. Gilchrist of Bath officiating by special request of the deceased. A mixed quartette—Mrs. Nellie Anderson, Miss V. Smith, H. E. Blackwell, and M. H. Craig—with Mrs. Blackwell as organist. Four Lachin boys were pall-bearers. The remains were tenderly laid to rest in the family lot adjoining the church. She was always kind to the poor and needy, never turned any from the door, always ready to help in sickness

or in trouble. Her memory will be cherished by all.
