MARKETS AND FINANCE

Toronto Live Stock. The receipts of live stock at the City Market, as reported by the railways, since last Friday, were 69 car loads, composed of 1,881 cattle, 493 hogs, 1,225 sheep and lambs and 93 calves.

The quality of cattle offered as fat was, as usual, not good, dealers stating that there were not as many good cattle as at the Junction on Monday, although the number were much larger all told.

Owing to receipts being lighter than for some time past trade was fair, but prices were no better all round.

Exporters--A few export bulls sold at from \$3.25 to \$4 per cwt.

Butchers--George Rowntree, who bought 150 butchers' fat, for the Harris Abattoir Company, reported the following prices: Fair to good butchers' fat, \$3 to \$4; cows, \$1.75 to \$3.25; canners, 75c to \$1 per cwt.

Feeders and Stockers--Messrs. H. & W. Murby report prices unchanged, as follows: Best feeders, 1,000 to 1,100 pounds, at \$2.25 to \$3.00; best feeders, 900 to 1,000 pounds, at \$2.00 to \$3.25; best stockers, 800 to 900 pounds, at \$2.65 to \$3; best stockers, 600 to 800 pounds, at \$2.25 to \$2.75; medium stockers, 500 to 700 pounds, at \$2 to \$2.25; common stockers, 500 to 700 pounds, at \$1.50 to \$1.75.

Milkers and Springers--Trade was good for the best quality milkers and springers. Prices ranged from \$40 to \$50 for good to choice cows, and \$25 to \$35 for common to medium.

Veal Calves--Trade in veal calves was steady at \$5 to \$6, with a few good ones at \$6.50 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs--Export sheep sold at \$2.75 to \$4 per cwt.; rams and ewes, \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt.; lambs, \$4.50 to \$5.25 per cwt.

Hogs--Hogs were quoted at the lowest price of the season. Mr. Harris quotes select, fed and watered, at \$5 per cwt.

Toronto Farmers' Market. The grain receipts to-day were small owing to the wet morning. The only offerings were a load of fall wheat, which sold at \$1 a bushel.
