THE official money order department at Ottawa has completed arrangements fo the establishment of a postal note system and within a few days three denomination will be on sale. There will be sixteen de nominations altogether, ranging from wenty cents to five dollars, but owing to the delay of the American Bank Note Co.. it is not possible to issue all at the same time. The commission will be one cent on orders up to 40 cents; two cents up dollars and a half ; three cents up to ive dollars.

A SHORT but sharp and severe lightnin storm passed over Yarmouth, N. S., shortly before 7 o'clock last Friday morning. Rain fell in torrents and was accom-paied by vivid lightning and heavy thunder. The new dwelling house of Mr. Harry K. Lewis was struck, The light-ning entered the main chimmney, knock-ing off about 25 bricks and splitting it to the roof. On the morning of the 19th the bodies were taken to the church, at Groveton, where a Requiem Mass was said for the repose of their souls. The pastor made a most affecting address relative to the sad accident, and spoke highly of the young men who had been so suddenly taken off. Mr. Patrick Baldwin, above referred to, then started for hou with the remains of the deceased. He ex peoted to arrive in this city on the even ing of the 20th; but in consequence of de-lay at Bangor, where sealed metallic cof-fins had to be procured at considerable ex-pense, he did not arrive till Thursday ev-ening the 21st. The bodies were taken to St. Teresa's, their native parish, on Friday morning, where the interment took place in the afternoon. Mr. Baldwin was a brother of Mrs. John Byrne of this city.
