PAINTING ANIMALS.

The following hints should be observed
in the painting of animals.
1. They should be kept comfortable and
quiet, and sufficient exercise should be given
to them.

2. When several articles of food are to
be used, the least palatable and nutritious
should be fed first, and the most nutritious
reserved to complete the process.

3. Their food should be suitable, and
it should be suitably prepared. Nearly all
domestic animals thrive better on a variety
of food, and they become cloyed with a
single article, when fed exclusively on it.

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5. Care should be taken that animals do
not become dyspeptic and indigestive, as they
sometimes do, owing to excessive feeding.

6. For fattening neat cattle, the advan-
tage of feeding them on roots is not so great
or so certain as it is in swine. For the
more-corn and cob meal ground together, as
they will give a more uniform and nutritive
food, and also be more palatable.

7. The health of swine is improved by keep-
ing them in a cool, airy, and well-ventilated
stable, where they can be kept clean and
fresh.

8. In fattening sheep, the advantage of
feeding them on roots is not so great or so
certain as it is in swine. For the more-corn
and cob meal ground together, as they will
give a more uniform and nutritive food,
and also be more palatable.
