COUNTY CLIPPINGS.

It is stated that Wingham doctor is a defendant in a seduction case entered for trial at the Middlesex fall assizes at London.

The Seaforth men will attend the Brussels and Wingham demonstrations and hope to meet the Mitchell men at these places. Mr. Joseph Laird sold his farm, lot 33, con. 6, McKillop, containing 100 acres to Mr. Samuel Dorrance, for a sum of \$5,700.

John Hannah of the Seaforth creamery, has sold his July make of butter for 18 1/2 cents per pound. There will be about 6,000 pounds. This is half a cent a pound more than the butter manufactured at the Model Farm Creamery for the same month sold for.

A correspondent writes from Escanaba, Delta county, Michigan, under date of August 26th, that the late John Sharp, of East Wawanosh, died on the 28th of July at his brother's home, Fayette, Michigan. The deceased was a daughter of the late John Diamond, of Hullett, in your county.

Mr. and Mrs. John Horton took to the excursion to the Falls and Grimsby last week, and report a pleasant time. The first fall wheat threshed for 1885 by the horse-power turned out 25 bushels to the acre, on the farm of James Horton, last week.

A painful accident, and one which may yet prove fatal, took place in the barn of John Owens, of East Wawanosh, on Friday evening last week. His eldest son, George, after putting down hay for the horse, jumped from the stack in a load on the barn floor. It struck near the groin on the left side, and extended upwards eighteen inches, breaking two ribs on the same side.

At a recent meeting of the directors of the McKillop Mutual Fire Insurance Company, the following resolution was passed: "Whereas it is necessary and expedient that by-law No. 25 of this company be repealed, and the following be substituted:—That in case of loss on personal property or contents of buildings insured in this company, the company pay in full up to amount of policy upon satisfactory proof of loss being made as provided by by-law, and it is moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Hannah, that the above resolution pass, and change in by-laws be forthwith made until next annual meeting."

D. M. Sullivan, of East Saginaw, Mich., is reported to have lowered three records at the St. Catherine's sports on Monday. For the hop, step and jump, without weights, the highest English record was by Gavan Tait, 31 ft. 10 in., at Glasgow, Scotland, in 1862. The highest American record is by M. W. Ford, 29 ft. 2 1/2 in., at New York, Feb. 16, 1883. Sullivan cleared 31 ft. 7 1/2 in., thus beating the American record. For three standing jumps, without weights, the highest record is by M. W. Ford, 33 ft. 3 1/2 in., at New York, Feb. 16, 1883. Sullivan cleared 33 ft. 4 1/2 in., at St. Helens, Nov. 27, 1880, and the highest American record is by J. P. Hartnett, 38 ft. 10 in., at Boston, Nov. 17, 1884. Sullivan cleared 39 ft. 3 in. Pains were taken in measuring these performances, so that they could stand as records. Sullivan formerly lived in Brussels.

A very sad and fatal poisoning accident occurred about two miles from Glenheim Monday. Three sons of David Walker found some wild pansies, which they mistook for spignep and ate. The eldest, Wallace, about twenty-four years old, died in a few hours. He leaves a wife and one child. The other two, aged 17 and 15, are very low, but the doctor has some hopes of their recovery.
