

PLANS FOR CITY BEAUTIFICATION

Report of Special Committee Received at Regular Meeting of Board of Trade Yesterday Afternoon—C. Leonard Gibbs Submits a Report.

From Tuesday's Daily. General plans for improvement and beautification of the city of Edmonton and suggestions of the means whereby this may be accomplished were presented to the Edmonton board of trade at its regular monthly meeting yesterday afternoon by the civic planning committee of the board in the form of an extensive report in the preparation of which the committee has been engaged for the past month.

The report was received with great favor by the members present at the meeting and it was decided that definite action should be taken to have the plans carried into effect. To this end the board will at once bring to the attention of the provincial legislature and the city council the need for immediate action and endeavor to secure their cooperation as it was pointed out by several members that the movement for the beautification of the capital city should be the concern of all the citizens and the government and not of any one section of the community.

CRIMINAL ASSIZES IN THE SUPREME COURT

Fifteen Cases Set Down for Hearing Which Opened Today Before Justice Simons—Evidence Being Taken in a Case of Non-Support.

From Tuesday's Daily. The criminal assizes opened in the Supreme Court this morning before Mr. Justice Simons. Fifteen cases were set down for trial and the prisoners were all arraigned with the exception of two, who are already serving terms in the penitentiary and will come up tomorrow morning. "Not guilty" was the plea in each case. Only three of the accused elected to be tried by jury. They were J. B. Whitestein, charged with holding a police constable with violence, and J. W. Smith, charged with converting money to his own use, and Carl Paul, charged with rape.

Unless something is done there is liable to be considerable suffering undergone and discontent follow, with the possibility added that discouraged by reports from the trail many intending settlers may be deterred from settling in the older and more accessible parts of Alberta.
