ACTIVE ON FRENCH FRONT.

PARIS. Sept. 12. Last night saw uninterrupted arillery fighting in several points along the line in France, according to a communication given out by French War Office to-day. There has been, furthermore, a particularly violent artillery engagement in the Department of the Meuse and along the front in Lorraine.

CROWN PRINCE'S FAILURE.
