At the Kirk.

Able Addresses Given by the Rev.
Dickle, M.A.—Service in the Even-
ing Devoted to Our Soldiers.

Taking as his text the words to be
found in Isaiah the 30th, 15th verse,
"In Greatness and in Confidence
Shall be Your Strength," the Pastor
delivered an able address at the
morning service. These words tell us
of quietness and strength. There are
some things in life which do not go
together: winter and summer, joy
and sorrow. We have put many in-
gredients together hoping to solve
the problem but find that they would
not mix. Quietness and strength
should go hand in hand or together.
We are living in an age of strife and
tumult. Our business duties are to-
day one of rush, worry and strain.
Years ago a vacation was looked upon
as a luxury, only for the wealthy to
enjoy. Not so to-day. Modernism has
made such an upheaval in the activi-
ties pertaining to our different call-
ings that mechanic, clerk and others
have found that absenting oneself
for a time from his labors, renews
and strengthens him for duty, and
makes life worth while. In the ardu-
ous duties of our Lord we hear of His
disciples to rest and meditate, spend-
ing hours in prayer to God for help to
carry on His great work to overcome
evil. The House of God is and should
be a place for everyone to spend a
quiet hour and on leaving carry away
with them the good which is always
there. But a good many in this rest-
less era do not like the preacher's
sermons, they do not want the ser-
mons of the prophets, but of the
times, and other things which to one
may cause animosity due to their
make-up. These lose to a large mea-
sure lots of good help, help which
strengthens, given in quietness of
the hour. The manoeuvres of an
undersea boat, some little time ago,
is a good example to all of us. When
in danger of the enemy's warships
this little craft would submerge com-
ing to the surface only when danger
was over. So in our daily routine of
life, when cares and worries bur-
dened us, let us steal away quietly,
think them over and reason with God,
who will avenge and help us to carry
these burdens. Kipling speaks of the
extraordinary silence which sur-
rounds the army officer. When we
look at the quiet and silent ways of
Lords Roberts and Kitchener, men
who when others were buying them-
selves, as to the business resources,
were quietly making preparations for
the safeguarding of their country,
and no doubt exists that if some of
their views had been accepted quite a
lot of good would have come out of it.
The church to-day has lost its effec-
tiveness on the individual as in the
past. But no doubt exists, that in the
future the place which she has lost
for the present will come back again,
and men will be strengthened by good
which dwells within the quietude of
her walls.

The service in the evening was de-
voted to soldiers. Despite the un-
favorable weather quite a number of
volunteers were present. Subject be-
ing: "Soldiers of the King and King-
dom." Text being found in the 2nd
Epistle of Timothy, 2nd chap, 4th
verse, "That he may please him who
hath chosen him to be a soldier." If
there is one teaching that is empha-
sized in the Gospel, it is that the
Kingdom of God is spiritual. Our
weapons are not carnal, no man that
wars can entangle himself with the
affairs of this life, but must please
Him who has chosen him to be a sol-
dier. The Christian and the soldier
may not travel much together, yet
each has something to learn from the
other. One thing we all must learn,
is that victory often comes only at
the last stage of the struggle. Na-
poleon took almost every capital of
Europe, yet at the Battle of Waterloo
he lost ultimate victory to the forces
under the leadership of Wellington.
This war is no exception to this rule.
Germany has been going on from
strength to strength. Belgium and
Servia have been overrun; Roumania
stands in the midst of desolation to-
day. When we view these things we
are inclined to complain, but we for-
get that this has been the normal
course of history. The Lord hum-
bleth us first in order that He may
exalt us later on. Against the dark
cloud of defeat, victory will shine all
the brighter. It is not the first word
but the last that will count in this
struggle. The soldier's visions and
the Christian's are alike. We all
stand in the great Temple of Life.
God reveals His presence. A curi-
ous thing happened at Mons. When
our brave soldiers were retreating
and victory was almost in the grasp
of the enemy, out of the clouds and
mist appeared an angel, whose pre-
sence aroused new hopes in our men,
spurred them on, and what looked
like defeat was ultimately turned in-
to victory. How is it so many of our
lads returning from the trenches
speak so proudly of the British Navy?
Do they not know and feel that the
presence of these mighty ships is
saving us from harm and keeping our
shores from danger? When this war

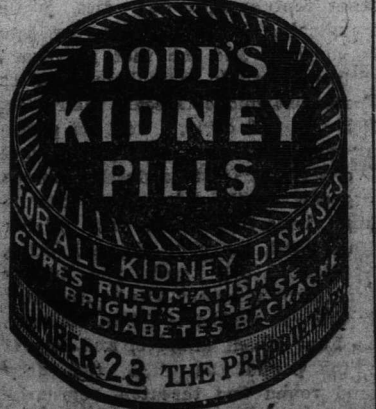
STILL AROUND.—The schr. Effie
