

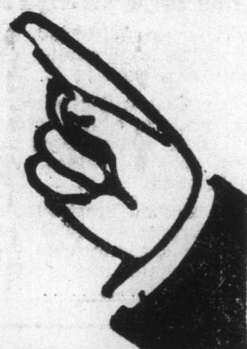

In the first place, however, it is not too late to make it a decent street as we see others. If money is required the Council knows where to get it for Leslie Street in particular.
