CORRECT DISTANCES.

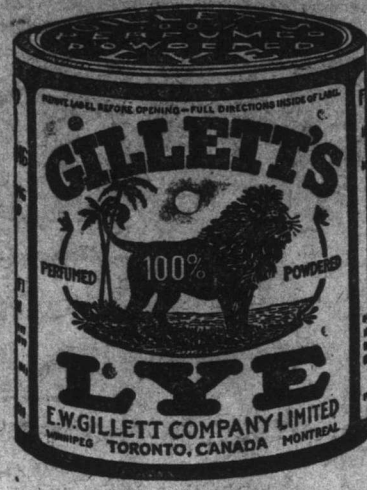

Standardization for Sweden.

STOCKHOLM.—Sweden has launched a country-wide movement for the standardization of manufactured products. There is to be a central standardization organization, under government control, under which subsidiary committees will conduct research work and make recommendations for various lines of manufacture. In the building, machine and electrical industries standardization has existed for some time; the present purpose is to extend the idea, and cause standard types to be officially and universally recognized. In this move Sweden is following the United States. It is cited here that a certain American tool manufacturer has reduced the number of types of hammers, axes, files and sledgehammers he makes from 2,752 to 751, and that an American paper concern reduced its types of paper to 10 per cent of the number previously manufactured. Great economy resulted in each case.

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Golfers Encourage

COATESVILLE, Pa., July 3.—Blacksnakes seeking a comfortable

home, rent and tax free, are invited to the golf links of the Coatesville Country Club. Along the sides of the course underbrush has been permitted to grow thick, and tempting rock piles with full southern exposures have

been placed to lure the snakes from adjacent lands. An educational campaign has been inaugurated among golfers with an aversion to reptiles in order that there may be no repetition of the deaths by violence which came to two of the organization's Champions of the blacksnakes. That it is the most efficient enemy of the ground mole, which mittedly is the natural enemy of greens.
