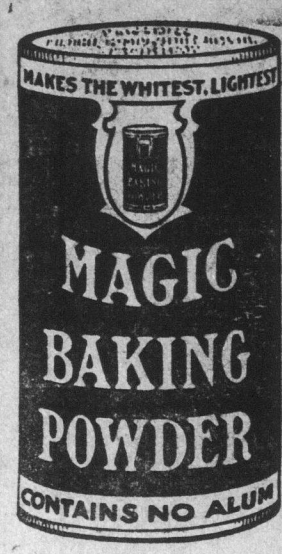

The enthusiasm displayed by the F.P.U. members three or four years ago has somewhat diminished, and a reversion of feeling is becoming quite popular among many once active members who have experienced the results of Coaker's glittering promises, which they now find always terminate in bluff.

He Knows the Government is Gone.

J. M. DEVINE LEAVES THE SINKING SHIP.

The announcement made from New York last week by Mr. John M. Devine that he is ready to stump the districts for the Bennett party is no surprise to independent and intelligent men. Mr. Devine has been in a position to see the damage done to the Trade and the Fisheries of the country by the ruinous policy of Squires and Coaker. Like all patriotic Newfoundlanders he is ready and willing to do everything in his power to destroy the Coaker menace to his native land. He was one of the most prominent supporters of Squires and Coaker in the General Election, 1919.

A man of great energy and a forceful speaker he made a very strong fight in Placentia District and it was mainly through his efforts that such a good vote for the party was gained in that District. After his defeat in Placentia, he accepted the position of Trade Commissioner at New York, and while acting in this capacity he, no doubt, gained the knowledge which informed him of the danger of having ignorant demagogues to conduct the trade and business of Newfoundland.

Mr. Devine stresses the point in reference to the ruin of the Herring Fishery, claiming that it was the Government's policy, or rather lack of policy, that killed this industry. He might have gone further and stated that the policy of the Government was ruinous to all our industries. In fact their policy was one of rule and ruin. We congratulate Mr. Devine on the stand he is taking, and no doubt Placentia will also congratulate him on his change of view, as it justifies the action of the people there in regard to Coakerism in 1919, as it will also be confirmed in 1923. It is an encouraging sign to find men of his experience and intelligence flocking to the Bennett party, and it is evident that the spirit of patriotism is yet sufficiently strong to overthrow the party of pawns led by Coaker and to restore confidence by returning to the Legislature men of integrity and independence. Sydney, N.S.—The golden jubilee of Rev. Dr. John Murray, one of the oldest ministers in the Presbyterian Church in Nova Scotia, was celebrated at Falmouth Street Church here recently. The news from the outport districts indicates a big victory for Bennett.

The day when abuse of the merchants would appeal successfully to the fishermen and get votes is over.

The time of supplying for the fishery is at hand and the District that has a Merchant to represent it will have good reasons for congratulations.

Sir Richard Squires' friends are now saying that a few more speeches like the one he delivered at the East End meeting last week will kill any little chance that the Government has of winning.

The language used in speaking of the Board of Trade and the merchants of Water Street was both undignified and indecent, and unworthy of a man aspiring to be Prime Minister of Newfoundland.

The silent man who is suffering the pinch of hard times the past three years and who appears to be taking no active part will decide this election.

He knows that Squires and Coaker have almost ruined the country; have bungled everything and he will vote for Bennett and Better Times.

Mr. Walter Monroe's offer to go to Bonaville, face Coaker in his strong hold and expose all his ruinous acts to the fishermen is the greatest instance of practical patriotism ever known in Newfoundland. Win or lose his name will be enshrined for ever in the hearts of the people.

Harbor Grace District is preparing for Bennett and his two colleagues the greatest reception ever accorded candidates in that District. The Government is spending wads of money there, but they can't buy up an intelligent constituency like Harbor Grace.

The Humber Deal must not be finalized by Squires made famous by Coaker as the \$5000 Premier.

The wild screams of the Government organs these days is the best proof that the "game is up" and the Government is defeated.

The people having suffered from their misrule too long and have made up their minds to turn them out. It only needs now to get the ballot papers in their hands when the wasters will be hurled into political oblivion.

The Northern fishermen would like to hear more about the fishery and less about the Humber Deal in Coaker's Advocate. One would think that fifty thousand fishermen of the country were going to sacrifice all their fishing gear, abandon their homes and go to a land flowing with milk and honey on the banks of the Humber.

A bounty on fish appeals more to the fishermen than a dozen Humber Deals. The fishery is their natural occupation and they want to be told how they are going to get a living out of it. They want a reduction in expenditure and taxation, and it is quite evident that they will not get this from Coaker and Squires. Turn them out and elect men who believe that the Fishery is and will continue to be our greatest source of employment.

The Humber as a place for men to go in the Fall and Winter to get work is all right for three or four thousand men like Grand Falls or Bell Island. It will be a good side line, but it will never take the place of the Fishery as an "earner," and all these glorious promises of what it is going to do are only meant to deceive and delude the people.

If the intention was not to deceive the people the full particulars would be known long ago. Squires wants you to vote for it first and tell you about it after. By this plan he hopes to get back. He won't trust you, then don't trust him. Elect the Bennett Government that will carry out the project if it is a good one. All Bennett's men have declared in favor of it, but they want to know and want you to know all the particulars, so that when both parties are in favor of the Humber Deal it is really not an issue at this election. To be an issue one party should be against. The important part is that a Government with such a record as the Squires-Coaker Government the past three years are not fit to be trusted with carrying it out honestly, cleanly and free from graft and squandering.

This only other issue then that Bennett is not the Leader. The intelligent people of the country—and they are sufficient to defeat the Government—can see through this dodge, and it will not work. It is not working but is essential as an insult to people's intelligence. Just as well to drop it the wasters will have to go.
