It is with pleasure, therefore, we observe that Mr. Mills, of Bothwell has given notice of a bill, which he is about to introduce into the Commons to disqualify members of the Local Legislature from holding a seat in that House. It is not to be expected that such a measure will pass without a vigorous opposition. It will have to encounter in all probability the whole antagonistic force of the Ministerial party, against many of whom it asms a direct blow, as there is a number of Sir John A.'s followers whose conduct in securing seats in both Houses was seeming proof of their intention to abandon previous occupations and henceforth labor alone in the field of legislation.
