—Mrs. H. Taylor and Miss Zada Taylor, of Oxford street, have gone for a sojourn at "The Willows," Markham, Ont.

—Signor Liberati spent Sunday at the residence of Mr. George Freeman, South London. The leading clarinetist is a nephew of Mrs. Freeman.

—Messrs. Tamin and Fulcher, of this city, left for Port Stanley to-day where they purpose camping for the remainder of the week. They made the trip in the saddle.

—It is likely that new tenders for the Springfield boiler house extension will be called for, as Mr. Charles Screaton, who secured the contract, was mistaken in what it called for.

The Seventh band has been engaged for the evening, and will consequently not give the scheduled band concert at the park.

A MUSICAL TREAT.

Signor Liberati's Famous Band at the Opera House Saturday night. Splendid Musical Exhibition.

Those who failed to attend the performance of Signor Liberati's famous musical combination in the Grand Opera House Saturday afternoon and evening missed one of the rarest musical treats ever presented to the public of this city. Perhaps the advent of Signor Liberati's aggregation, so soon after Glenora's celebrated band, had something to do with the lack of patronage, although many candidly expressed it as their opinion that the performance eclipsed anything ever offered by Glenora's renowned company of stars. There was a small attendance at the matinee, but the audience was a representative one, musically speaking, and attested the appreciation by enthusiastic plaudits. There was a larger crowd in the evening. The first numbers were a march by Liberati, the overture, Rigoletto, and Wagner, and the Mandelstam waltz by Metra, rendered by the full band of 50 instruments with a vim and brilliancy of execution that captured the audience at the start.

Signor Liberati conducted the performance, and although it must require a vast amount of physical exertion, he appears at the end of each selection with the same smile on his good-humored face. The subsequent numbers were received with rounds of the heartiest applause; and had the signor allowed his good nature to have been imposed upon by responding to the numerous encores, he would assuredly have been detained all night by the enthusiastic audience. Miss Ellen Parpa has a narrow escape from a fatal accident, and a wonderful compass. She received a double encore from the delighted crowd, but was content to exhibit her handsome personage, and smilingly bow her acknowledgments from a side entrance. The rendering of "Robert Bruce" by a full chorus took the audience by storm, as the familiar old Scotch airs were given, and vocal interludes and the firing of pistols, with a crash and a dash that left one breathless at the finish. Mons. Bour's oboe solo was a delightful rendition and was loudly encored. Signor Liberati's cornet solo was a splendid illustration of staccato playing, and amply demonstrated his range and capability. The signor's abilities as a clarinetist are too well known to need description. Suffice it is to say that in his hands his favorite instrument is a magic wand, and he can bring from it almost any kind of melody to his pleasure. The next time his famous combination of musical artists appear in this city, they will doubtless be greeted with crowded houses.

A \$10,000 BLAZE.

W. Y. Brunton's Stock Ruined—Origin of the Fire a Mystery.

On Saturday evening, at about 10:55, as an ADVERTISER reporter was going his rounds he chanced to glance in at W. Y. Brunton & Son's drygoods store, 195 Dundas street, and noticed what seemed to be a pile of factory cotton blazing on a rear counter. He immediately gave the alarm, and the brigade were promptly on the spot. The store had been closed for the night only a few minutes before the flames were discovered, and the firemen had to break open the front and back doors in order to obtain entrance. By this time the flames had spread rapidly owing to the large amount of straw goods in stock. The fire brigade worked hard, however, and in half an hour's time the blaze was extinguished, but not before the entire stock was almost ruined. Fortunately the fire was confined to the immediate rear of the store, and although the ceiling was badly scorched, the apartments overhead were not damaged to any material extent. The firemen say that the inside of the building was the hottest place they ever entered.

Mr. Brunton estimates the loss at from \$10,000 to \$12,000. How the fire started is a mystery. The only explanation that presents itself, is that a match or lighted cigar had been left on the counter before the store was closed, and had ignited some of the straw lying round it. The stock comprised nearly everything found in a drygoods store, including a large amount of straw goods as well as cottons, cambrics, ribbons, felts, etc., and what occupied the fire was badly injured by smoke and water. The glass show-cases inside and the plate windows in the front door were also destroyed.

The contents of the store were insured in five companies, among them the Hartford and Aetna. Out of this number Mr. Edward Towe has one policy of \$800 and Mr. A. M. Smith the remainder. The amount of insurance was dropped from \$10,000 to \$8,500 on Monday last on account of depletion of stock. The building, which is owned by Mayor Taylor, is comparatively uninjured.
