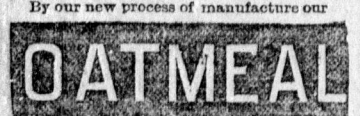

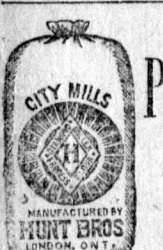

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 7-11 p.m.—To-

night the pressure is highest over the upper

lakes and Manitoba, and there is a deep de-

pression near the north of the Bay of Fundy,

causing heavy rains in the Maritime Pro-

vinces, and another over the extreme Northwest

Territories, accompanied by very warm

weather. The weather has been generally

fair, except in Nova Scotia and New Brun-
