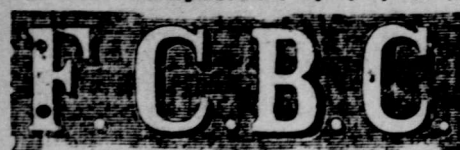


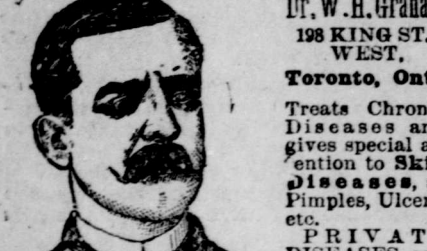

—Toronto Star: Frank Kirchmer, at one time manager of the Academy of Music (formerly of London), was in the police court this morning, charged with non-payment of wages. Harry Todd says Kirchmer owes him \$250. The defendant stepped up and paid \$2 into court, promising to pay the other 50 cents in a few days.

—Refreshment booths at the Fair Grounds were auctioned yesterday afternoon. The following were the buyers and the amounts paid: T. Jeffries \$18, R. Shopland \$16, T. Jeffries, \$20, A. Ensign Sir, sub-editor of the War Cry, assisted in the meetings Sunday. Next Saturday, Sunday and Monday they will celebrate their annual harvest festival, when a good time is promised. Sergt.-Major Dawson, of Guelph, will be the chief attraction.

—Class Baker, 40 years of age, was arrested last night by Detective Ward at his home on the base line, Westminster, about 10 o'clock. Mrs. Baker came in to Squire Lacey yesterday afternoon and laid an information against her husband for abusing her. Baker was brought before the magistrate and remanded for a week. Baker is a farm laborer and has not even the good wishes of his neighbors because of his worthlessness. His wife said he had only given her 75 cents in two months. In Trouble Again.

Isaac Bird Arrested on Another Serious Charge

By Chief Skirving of Ingersoll—Accused of Criminally Assaulting a Girl Under 14 Years.

Ingersoll's wide-awake chief of police, Archie Skirving, has laid hands on Isaac Bird, the colored man who achieved notoriety in London a few months ago. He was accused of seducing Maud Phoenix, a local colored girl. After a protracted examination and trial, Bird was acquitted by Judge Elliot because it could not be proven that the girl was under 14 years of age at the time of the offense. Bird returned to Ingersoll upon his dismissal.

The charge upon which the scamp is now in the toils is the same. The complainant is Ellen Marsh, a girl under 14 years of age. She accuses Bird of violently assaulting her on Feb. 5 last, despite her frantic opposition at a house on the sixth concession of Dereham township, kept by a man named Johnston. The girl lives at Johnston's, and Bird was visiting there at the time. The arrest was made by Chief Skirving at the instance of the chief of police of Tilsonburg. Bird was taken there by Chief Skirving yesterday to await examination. The Piper girl is about to become a mother.

Camp for London.

Volunteers Will Be Here During the Western Fair.

A Great Double Attraction—The Battalions Ordered Out.

As announced in The Advertiser last night, the volunteer camp will be held on Carling's Heights, beginning Sept. 8 and ending Sept. 19.

As the Western Fair begins on Sept. 10 and ends on Sept. 19, London will have two great attractions simultaneously. The date fixed for the camp is later than in previous years, but owing to the change at headquarters, this was unavoidable, and, besides, it will be much pleasanter camping in September than in mid-summer, when the blistery heat adds to the discomforts of life under canvas.

The camp and the Fair will by no means be rival attractions, but will work admirably together. Many Fair visitors will be delighted at the opportunity of witnessing this unique spectacle on the Heights, and the volunteers themselves will prefer to be in London when the Fair is in progress and the city so lively and crowded.

Lieut.-Col. Smith, D.A.G., will be the commandant of the camp, and as usual his staff will be composed of officers of the district. The camp will be composed of No. 1 Company, Royal Regiment Canadian Infantry, and the following battalions:

An important militia order was before the Cabinet Council at Ottawa on Saturday, and will be promulgated in a day or two. The general order will greatly affect the establishment. The following are its salient points:

Cavalry—All troops of cavalry become squadrons. An addition of about seven men is made to each squadron in order to enable them to drill in accordance with the revised cavalry drill. Each squadron receives an addition of one officer.

Field Artillery—Each battery is raised from four to six guns in establishment. The increase will include one officer and about one-third of the present strength. The former strength was 49 of all ranks; the present strength will be 102; the former strength in horses was 29; the present strength will be 49.

Hillsdale Manor, N. J., Aug. 25.—An heiress to \$17,000,000 was married yesterday afternoon in a little cottage on the hillside overlooking this village and Woodcliff. The bride wore a simple costume of black silk, becoming to her 53 years, and made by her own hands.

She was Mme. Eglantine Gaudin, village dressmaker of Hillsdale Manor and Woodcliff, whose sudden enrichment by the death of her South American uncle was announced some months ago. She had not yet come into all her money, but her lawyer bids her rest easy—it is coming.

But, as she says, she has done better still. She has found a husband who prefers her to her fortune. Out of hundreds of suitors, of high and low degree, who have offered themselves since her good fortune was published, she has made her choice. He is Bernardo Malizia, superintendent of a New York company, a Swiss-Italian, and madame's junior by five years.

The secret came out at last, Mme. Gaudin, after repelling or ignoring nearly a thousand offers of marriage, had succumbed at last to the plain, homely man who superintended the repairs about her premises.
