> In spite of the Queen's amiable and irreproachable character and her unvarying and scrupulous regard for the constitution of her country, she has been the subject of several attempts on her life. They have all failed entirely, but at least three of them came near to doing harm. The Queen showed considerable personal courage on these occasions. The first attempt was made by Ed-

ward Oxford, on June 10, 1840. He discharged a pistol at her Majesty when she was going up Constitution Hill. The man was quite mad, and after being captured was sent to Bedlam and thence to Dartmore where, after 34 years, he was transported to Australia, where he set up in business as a house painter. Nearly two years later, on May 30, 1842, and almost in the same place, John Francis fired at the Queen. He was sentenced to death for this act, but was afterwards reprieved, and was transported to Tasmania. The third attempt was made on July by a deformed youth named John William Bean, but his pistol missed fire. He was imprisoned for eighteen months in Newgate.


