Severely Shaken.

Heavy Earthquake Shocks in California and Mexico.

The City of Tehuantepec in Ruins—But No Loss of Life Reported.

Gilroy, Cal., June 21.—The heaviest earthquake shock ever felt here yesterday, but only a few seconds' duration, but did much damage, numerous chimneys were toppled over, house walls cracked, every plate glass store window was shattered, and there was a general wreckage of bottles and shelf-ware in houses and stores. People rushed out of their homes in terror. In some houses blinds were wrenched from the hangings and an unusual commotion and petty destruction is presented in nearly every house and store in town.

San Francisco, Cal., June 21.—Two sharp and severe shocks of earthquake were felt here yesterday, the official time of the first, as taken by the United States weather bureau, being 12:14:04. It was followed almost immediately by a second shock. The vibrations were from west to east. Clocks were stopped, suspended lamps and decorations were broken in some places. The shocks were the most severe experienced here for many years. The earthquake was general throughout the state.

At Hollister, shortly after noon, on Sunday, the most severe earthquake shock since 1889 did much damage to dollars of damage here to buildings and their contents. No loss of life occurred, though many injuries and escapes are reported. Every brick building in town has suffered and in the courthouse the walls and ceilings have lost most of their plastering. A fire wall of the McMahon House fell upon the adjoining buildings. Hundreds of window panes were cracked or broken, and in some instances entire window sashes were thrown into the street from the second story of the building.

Oaxaca, Mexico, June 21.—The continued earthquake shocks and heavy rains have resulted in a fire which destroyed a number of houses and a number of people were killed. The earthquake during the past three days.

Advices were received here last night that the official commission sent to the city of Tehuantepec by President Diaz, to investigate the reported destruction of a volcano, and the extent of the earthquake damages, has arrived at its destination, and there are grave fears that none of them will survive the terrible accident.

ATTACKS ON THE QUEEN.

Queen Victoria's Numerous Escapes From Assassination Since Ascending the Throne.

Queen Victoria, who is in her 76th year, has many years. In doing this she has had to surmount dangers which do not beset ordinary mortals.

In spite of the Queen's amiable and irreproachable character and her unvarying and scrupulous regard for the constitution of her country, she has been the subject of several attempts on her life. They have all failed entirely, but at least three of them came near to doing her harm. The Queen showed considerable personal courage on these occasions.

The first attempt was made by Edward Oxford, on June 10, 1840. He discharged a pistol at her Majesty when she was going up Constitution Hill. The man was quite mad, and after being captured was sent to Bedlam, and then to Dartmoor, where, after 21 years, he was transported to Australia, where he set up in business as a house painter.

Nearly two years later, on May 30, 1842, and almost in the same place, John Francis fired at the Queen. He was sentenced for this to seven years in Newgate, but he was afterwards reprieved, and was transported to Tasmania.

The third attempt was made on July 3 by a deformed youth named John William Bean, but his pistol missed fire. He was imprisoned for eighteen months in Newgate.

Again, in May, on the 19th, in the year 1849, and a third time on Constitution Hill, William Hamilton fired at her Majesty. He, however, was only sentenced to transportation for seven years.

The last occasion in which anybody attempted to injure her Majesty was 2 days after the thanksgiving for the recovery of the Prince of Wales, when a young man named Arthur O'Connell, who was a member of the crowd in the courtyard of Buckingham palace and threatened the Queen with a pistol. John Brown, who was then her Majesty's closest personal attendant, seized the youth and took the revolver from him, which was found to be unloaded.

LIGHTNING'S QUEER PRANKS.

Bolt in Indiana Churns Milk and Unearths Hidden Treasure.

South Bend, Ind., June 21.—Lightning played some queer pranks here yesterday. A bolt struck the residence of George M. Moore, tearing off the siding, scattering the wall paper in strips over the floor and knocking the contents of a bedstead, and a large iron box full of gold and silver and other articles. Many of the coins are of Spanish make, over 200 years old, and are very valuable.
