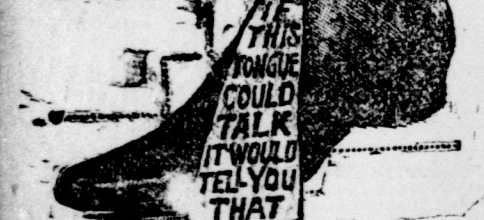

AMERICAN POLITICS.

McKinley on the "Gold" Platform—The Color Line in St. Louis.

St. Louis, June 10.—Ex-Congressman Thompson, manager pro tem. of the McKinley forces, has set at rest what will be the vital plank in the platform upon which Mr. McKinley expects to stand.

"It will be for the single gold standard, pure and simple," he promptly replied to a reporter's query. The Republican National committee are in a quandary as to the care of colored delegates to the convention, as every hotel, cafe and boarding house in the city has issued a pronouncement drawing the color line. Money is no object, and they declare they will entertain no negro, either as a guest or customer.

FOUR FISHERMEN MISSING.

Gloucester, Mass., June 10.—The schooner Henry A. Perkins, which has arrived here, reports four of her crew missing. They are: James Ellisworth, Galveston, Texas; Victor Amato, Louis Busby, Charles Martello, natives of France. On the 31st of May these men were out in dories tending trawls on the Grand Banks. A dense fog shut down suddenly, severing their vessel from view. Several days were spent searching for the men, during which two steamers and three other vessels were sighted in the vicinity, but none of them could give any information of the missing men, and Capt. Calder finally sailed for home without them.

FRANK MAYO.

Omaha, Neb., June 10.—Frank Mayo, the actor, whose death on a train was announced yesterday, was 57 years old. He was born in Boston, Mass. He went to California in 1882, and his first appearance on the stage was in 1886, as a waiter in the farce of "Raising the Wind" under the management of Laura Keane. Mayo got the position of leading man at McGuire's Opera House, San Francisco, and for a long time supported all the stars that visited the coast. In 1885 he came east, and opened at the Boston Theatre, Aug. 23, and played the entire season. He had starred practically ever since. "Davy Crockett" the play in which he became famous, was first produced at Rochester, N. Y., Sept. 24, 1872.

IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

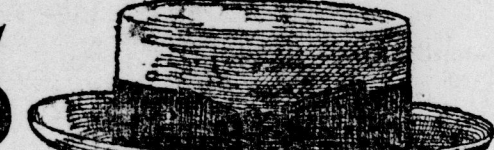
