Two Huge Boilers Blown About 100 Feet Away-Engine House Completely Wrecked-Joseph Hether ington Badly Scalded.

Residents in the southeastern part of the city were startled this morning at about 7:10 by a terrific crash, which was caused by the exploding of Trumpets. a huge boiler at the bending factory, Rattles. situated on the north side of Horton street, near Adelaide. The houses for some distance around were shaken. An employe of the factory, who was on his way to work, was just a short distance from the building, when the explosion took place. He states that the ground shook, and that the noise was deafening. A cloud of dust rose in the air, and he heard things striking the ground on all sides.

John Sutherland, another employe,

and almost blinded with brick dust. An overcoat, which he was wearing, was torn to shreds, by the force of the shock. Mr. Sutherland was also slightly burned. Jos. Hetherington, employed at the factory, was terribly scalded about the face and neck. He was standing near

was standing at the rear of the build-ing. He was sprinkled with hot water,

The two huge boilers placed in the Round Post Cradles. engine house were thrown about 100 feet away into the back yard of an Adelaide street residence, crashing into a woodshed and fence, demolishing them. The boilers are about eighteen feet in length and very heavy. A few feet more and they would have fallen on the house. The engine-room was totally destroyed, the walls and roof being blown out and the bricks were scattered in every direction. Bits of fron and brick were found over half a Pacing Bobs. block from the scene of the accident.
