Tokio, Jan. 13. - The bodies of Russian cavalry raiders actively operating southwest of Liao Yang are evidently desirous of harassing Japanese railroad communication and interrupting the transportation of Gen. Nogi's army to reinforce Field Marshal Oyama at Liao

FOR KILLING CHINAMEN

Russian Sailors at Shanghai To Be Court-Martialed.

London, Friday, Jan. 13. - A dispatch to the Times from Shanghai says that for killing sailors whose punishment for killing a Chinaman the authorities have long tried to procure will be tried by court-martial at the Russian consulate Friday. The Viceroy, who is entirely unable to appreciate the position and duties of China as a neutral, requested the senior consul to obtain the trial of men before a mixed court, in the presence of a Chinese assessor. The Russian consul declined, as such a course is not accorded by treaty, whereupon the Taotai intimated that China would possibly refuse further protection to Russian warships. Be Compelled to Act Against the Mongolians Tokio, Jan. 12.-Gen. Nogi reports that

Russia Informs the Powers She Will

The Japanese achievement at Port Arthur is more remarkable in the light of further investigations. The original Russian strength is now estimated to have been almost 50,000 men. It is announced at the army headquarters that in addition to the prisoners already reported, about 13,000 wounded combatants will eventually be brought to Japan. Gen. Nogi's headquarters staff at Port Arthur are at present devoting their energies to dispatching the prisoners to Japan, placing the wounded in hospitals and clearing the way for a thorough investigation of the spoils of war. Confused reports reach Tokio of the condition of the city buildings. It was said today that Gen. Nogi will return to Tokio at present.
