# CREW SAVED OFF THE CAPE HORN

#### Twenty-Seven Sailors Rescued from Sinking Ship After Desperate Fight.

Seattle, Wash., March 23.-Twentyseven people were rescued from icy werp. The men saved were members edit. of the crew of the British ship Deudraeth Castle, which foundered off the Horn some months ago. They were successful private business, and there they were sent to England in a homeward-bound ship.

The Pass of Killiekrankie herself had an exceptionally long passage. For of the prosecution. more than nine weeks she was beating around the Horn, unable to get past the stormy cape. One of her boats was lost everboard and several sails were blown to shreds by sudden gales, The ship has a record for saving life. Two years ago this March she picked up the crew of the fishing schooner Penelope in Clallam Bay. The sailors on the ship performed a heroic piece of work in making the rescue.
